MR. FERGUSON: I'm glad that everybody's here.

Thank you for taking your time to make sure that

we're going to be successfully moving forward -
year. We had a great year in certain areas. In

some areas we had work with, but this is going to be

a good report when the finance officer comes up and

explains how we got through this year. But I

greatly appreciate everybody's efforts. It wasn't

by me. It was by teamwork we get this thing done,

so thank you, and I appreciate it and thank you.

MR. WALLOT: Thank you, sir. Okay. We'll go

-- the main reason for this meeting is to go through
and approve the items that are over budget by 10

percent, and some explaining if they're over that
that has to be approved by the NEC. So with that,

I'm going to hand the microphone over to our finance
officer so he can explain his overages.

MR. RIVERA: Thank you, sir. Okay. I -- I've passed the report out to everybody. You can see in the income we have a few areas that there was zero. Obviously, we didn't get -- we weren't on mark in those areas. You can see in the other income on the

inheritance grants and the bequests, we were 284 percent over, so we actually brought in 133,857 in bequests that we did not calculate, so that was a great thing for us.

The MOPH Fund, Inc., we did not receive anything this year from them as far as donation-wise, so hopefully, that -- we can get something moving along with that in the future. The Legacy Program -- the Flipcause PayPal Legacy Program, we are up to \$17,187.10, so that program is actually starting to pay off for us. Total other donations which we received through PayPal, and checks, and all that, we came in with 37,396.05.

Membership cards. You can see we had projected 3,300, and it only came in at 1,668, so I think over a period of time, since we started offering that, I think less patriots are -- are needing a card. This year, the MOPH store, we really didn't do anything with that. Google AdSense, we actually went -- we did really good on Google AdSense. We -- when you go on the website and you see that little popups and stuff, we actually made \$5,109, and that's what we get paid for that so it's a revenue source.

The PCI book, the contract that I signed when I was national commander back in 2021, we finally



received the \$50,000 for that. Membership dues this We had projected 62,200. We came in with 54,933. We were a little under on that but what we did do is we have a temporary membership now, and so they can start out with \$50, and we figured that out this year we brought in 44,045.44. So we've figured that out. We -- we're tracking that now as far as -- so that we can send e- mails out to them to say, hey, you know, you're within this level of -- you know, you need to make a couple more payments in order for us to do that, for you to become a member. The Youth Services, 37. The VAVS fund scholarship, now the NEC approved -- it was budgeted for 5,000, but we actually sent out a vote for that and we got -- in the actual we received from that was 30,000. It was -- was transferred from that account directly into ours, and that money was then transferred to the restricted account, so that money is in the proper restricted accounts. It repaid the money that we did for scholarships this year, and it's going to push forward for next year. We -- there was 315,000. It was paid to the operating account for -- 60 percent of that went to the headquarters, 40 percent of that went out to the chapters and departments. So we had a projected income of

641,987. We actually -- actual was 731,269.92 so we actually did pretty well this year, but we ended up with 89,282.92 more than was projected for the year in income.

So moving down, the very first one that is the 122 percent is the membership cards, certificate printing the new cards. We had budgeted 1,200. It ended up costing us 1,458.94. That's at 122 percent. What had happened with that was this was a cleanup. We had to pay for cards that -- there was an invoice that came in for the prior year for the cards, so that was the overage of that 122 so we're actually 12 percent over the 10 percent on that one. So that's one right there.

Do you want -- do you want to go -- when we go over 10 percent, you want an explanation?

MR. WALLOT: All they want to know -- all they want if it's over 10 percent.

MR. RIVERA: It's 122 percent --

MR. WALLOT: Over.

MR. RIVERA: -- so it's -- that one right there is the membership cards, certificates printing. So what happened is when we got into the headquarters, we had quite a few bills that were pushed over from the year prior, and so we -- and I can tell you,

almost every single overage was caused with that, is that we had to pay the bills, and we took care of the bills that were due.

MR. RIVERA: Okay. Moving on. So the next over 10 percent would be the estimated payroll tax. It was -- we had it projected at 21,279, and it was 13,000 so that's at 162 percent. And if you see that we paid last year's fiscal year tax. When we got there, they hadn't paid the payroll trust for the -- we had to pay for two quarters to catch up and that's where the 13,286.70 came in. So that's where the 162 percent is. So the next one, the outside bookkeeper. We had it -- the -- we had the outside bookkeeper at 18,000. That was what was approved. It ended up costing 23,881.70. That was 133 percent.

Now, this organization cannot operate without a bookkeeper. Anybody thinks it can is it -- we're going to be heading down a real bad path. So we ended up going 5,881 over, and so, to date right now, everything's migrated, QuickBooks Online, and we are reconciled. I think the first time in many years that our accounts are reconciled. We're working on the audits, and it's making life a lot

easier. So that's where the overage came on that.

We saw it coming, but we're in the middle of the audits, and so we did not even come close on our total payroll. So the overall amount, we only ended up at about 40 percent of that. So the total for employees. So we went over on that so it helped with the audits. I put that on there.

Now, the Commander's Awards, that's at 244 percent. We got there. We had to pay for the outgoing administration, all the -- the Commander's Awards. We got an invoice for those and that's why that's at 244 percent. It was only budgeted for 500 and we ended up spending \$1,222.43, and that's why that's over at 244.

So moving down to the next one would be copier printer lease, Delange (phonetic). Now, we actually resigned a -- for -- and we no longer -- it no longer costs us the -- we don't -- we're out of that contract. The contract is -- is over, and that was -- the reason that happened is there was a bill at the end of last year that was not paid, so we had to do all of our year, which our bills are all caught up and paid, and we had to pay a portion of the year prior.

Now, one of the things in that area is, we got



a refund of \$2,000 from Canon. So the refund from Canon is -- so that would actually be 2,019.80. So that's been deposited, but I think we got that after the end of the -- the fiscal year so that'll go into next year. Now it's -- what is it? 438 now? Or 4 -- yeah, it's about \$400 instead of the 1,100 so we actually saved. We got a way better printer -- commercial printer. It's a -- it's way better, nicer, more efficient, and it's not -- you know, we have a -- we're going to be paying for one anyway, so it's much better.

Now moving on to supplies for the copy printer maintenance, this was one right here that we're 201, and that was a prior year bill. For some reason, a lot of the bills at the end of last year were not paid.

MR. FERGUSON: If you also remember, that they were charging us for the two. If you remember we were charged for copiers that were sitting there. They estimated prints and we never did get that so that's where we had to argue back on that.

MR. RIVERA: Okay. Moving on down, the next one is the D&O Liability Policy, which that is paid until almost through the entire next year. So it's at, what, 192 percent, prepaid insurance into next

year. We have two of them. We have the Hartford Bond, which the dates are wrong in there. I didn't change the dates. It should be into -- it -- it's into next year. And also the D&O policy, that's paid, and it's paid all the way through to what? April of '25, so yeah, it's -- that -- that's all prepaid insurance.

MR. WALLOT: In case someone doesn't know, D&O insurance as directors and officers for their liability.

MR. ADKINS: That's correct.

MR. WALLOT: Moving on.

MR. RIVERA: Moving on. Okay. Next three of five. So QuickBooks Online, we transferred to QuickBooks Online. We're having issues. The reason it's 138 is we projected the 2,940. That's for the desktop version, and we're having an issue closing out the desktop version, so we don't use it anymore. We have everything backed up. All the QuickBooks are backed up. So we're going to have to work on getting that closed out because we've been with them for so long, you sure you want to close it out?

We're like, yeah, we want to close it. I mean, you know, we can just shut off the payment to it, but we're trying to work on that. That's where we're

138. So we are 100 percent online. Everything is done electronic. We have real time accounting now. We can go online, know exactly how much money is in the bank and all that. So that will be reduced, but that's 138 because we needed both for the migration.

TrueShred. We paid a huge portion of last year's bill. That's why it's at 226. We paid last year's bill again. Uline. So the Uline, it's ROT -- ROTC shipping supplies. Why that is \$3,498 over, and it's 333 percent, is they ordered furniture last year and -- through Uline, and it was \$3,498.31, and we got stuck with the bill. So we had to pay the bill. So there was \$3,500 worth of furniture purchased from headquarters. Two conference room tables, a big screen TV, and some chairs which --

MR. RIVERA: -- and a laptop, right. So yeah, so that's where that is through Uline. That's the 333 percent.

MR. ADKINS: And a laptop.

Okay. Moving on down, one or two. So Verizon.

I -- right here it's 112 so we're 2 percent over the 10. Paid deposit and into the next year. So we're paid with Verizon through now into the next fiscal year. We have to pay a deposit to get it set up. So that's why we're at 2 percent over on that. So

Election Buddy is fine. It's 5 percent.

Moving on down to the website. Maintenance is at 140. We -- there was -- we had to pay \$9,800 for a website that was designed the year prior. We got the bill for \$9,800, and we had to pay it. It was the last prior bill, so we actually went over 2,800 on that. And that was last year's bill, so it wasn't -- it was \$9,800 that they paid a company to redesign the website, and we never got anything out of it, so we had to pay the bill.

Okay. Going down to the Zoom. The Zoom is at 153. One of the things that was paid from the prior year. The problem with that is that there was a bunch of recordings on there and they charge us every month for the -- to keep a hold of the recordings, so -- and I think that we've got that taken care of now, so now that -- it -- it's not going to be that amount. But that was more than was paid from the year prior. Constant Contact is at 1 -- it's right at the 110. There was an increase in the cost that they hit us in right when we came in, so that's where that's at, the 110.

So the next one going through here is the National Adjuvant Travel. So we had a national adjuvant. It was only approved for the 3,000 on the



1	national adjuvant so the issue with that was that
2	national adjuvant, the one that came in resigned,
3	and he lived there so when Chuck Adkins came in and
4	became the adjuvant, he had to travel from Arkansas
5	up there. But we didn't even come close to spending
6	we were only, I think, at like 40-something
7	percent total for all the travel, so we still came
8	in under travel, but it was critical for the
9	national adjuvant to be in headquarters.
10	So moving on down, we had the budget was
11	approved for \$708,649.73. We spent 592,904.17, so
12	we came in under budget 115,745.56, so we only spent
13	84 percent of the budget overall.
14	MR. WALLOT: Very good. Thank you, sir.
15	MR. ADKINS: Good report.
16	MR. WALLOT: Is there any questions pertaining
17	to the overages and the budget?

MR. RIVERA: So what are you --

with those bills being left open?

MR. WERTHEIM: In other words -- so in other words, the last year's finance officer turned over everything and just walked away without clearing out his --

MR. RIVERA: Well, yeah, because he -- so what happened last year was the national commander and the national adjuvant resigned prior to the end, and so, what -- what happened is, is that the bookkeeper stole some money and -- which she's actually being charged right now. We -- I -- I went through, calculated it all. We turned it in. We pressed charges through the sheriff's office, the detective, and everything. And so she was terminated. And what happened is they didn't bring in another bookkeeper for a little bit, and so what was happening was they were doing the warrants, but nobody was actually paying the bills. So we came in, right into it. We got all the bills and everything because that -- what -- the problem you have is with the fiscal year the way it's set now, it's like right now, whoever the national commander is next year, we're paying bills under their budget because of the fiscal year closing on June 30th. And so, what happened is, the last couple of months going in June, July, and then into August, we come

in there in August, the bills weren't paid. Nobody paid the bills. So when we got in there, that was -- that -- those were legitimate bills that had to be paid, and so -- but it kicked over onto ours because July 1st our year came in, so we had to pay those bills. They were not paid by the prior finance officer, whoever that they had.

MR. WERTHEIM: My question is such that the last year's finance officer is looking to join the finance committee, so it's really a prelude to do we want him to be joining the finance committee? Did he leave the position adequately to go --

MR. WALLOT: When the election gets here, that's a question that what if we get hit by lightning tomorrow. At the election time if he gets up and stands up, that's when you question.

MR. WERTHEIM: Withdraw my remarks.

MR. WALLOT: Thank you, sir. Okay, everyone understands that when -- the finance committee is allowed to go up to 10 percent over the line item budget. When it goes beyond that, they usually, according to the bylaws, need a request to the NEC to extend that. Most of these that Ernie just read are past 110 percent, all of them, so even though the bylaws have been bent or broken on this case,

there seems to be a legitimate reason for all of it in my mind. So I guess I'm going to ask for a motion that we accept --

MR. PICKART: Motion by Pickart to accept.

MR. WALLOT: Need a second.

MR. J. ANDERSON: Jim Anderson, second.

MR. WALLOT: All those in favor of accepting last year's budget say aye.

MR. WALLOT: Opposed. Motion carried. That'll go to the NEC on the floor for the same vote, and that's what that's going to look like. Other stuff under unfinished business, first of all, I wasn't here last year. First convention, I missed in 27 years and almost didn't make it, so there's some of this stuff -- when you miss a convention, you kind of miss a whole year that went by, and then you miss the new one that started, so essentially, it's like you missed two years. So a lot of people said, well, Dennis, it's good to see you again, and I -- my response has always been, better to be seen than viewed, and that's how close I was. So with that, I got a few things that also pertain to your question, Craig. I got a letter here just recently, July 2nd second from JP Morgan. Tim Felix has asked

to -- updating his paperless preferences on the Internet for our accounts.

MR. ADKINS: He's not on the accounts. He's not on them but he's asked --

MR. WALLOT: Asked --

MR. ADKINS: Because he thinks he's going to be voted on --

MR. WALLOT: The other thing is I've got all the paperwork. The people that aren't elected to the committee, the new commanders, the adjuvants, and the new finance committee person or persons, I'll need all their signatures, phone numbers, and I've talked to both banks already. Part of the reason that — with some of the bylaw changes it's every — our monies right now in the life membership fund are managed, okay? So on a managed account, we really don't do much. There's one small account that I bounce around a little bit and that's all in ETFs and — and TVA bonds, so the report, 78 pages with Chase, you get a paper report. My personal opinion is to vote no on these bylaw changes. That will fall under new business.

The other thing I've got, I've been told that all our chapters and departments now have changed their fiscal year; is that correct?



MR. RIVERA: Well, they didn't, no.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No.

MR. WALLOT: No? Okay. Because I haven't been

notified by the IRS. Yeah, go ahead.

MR. RIVERA: Ernie Rivera as finance officer.

So what happened is that it had been a couple years since we had updated as the parent unit all of the EINs underneath us. So what -- when we got everything done and we submitted it in there, the -the -- the internal revenue service lined it down and just had the fiscal year on from all the supporting units under ours. So it was -- we submitted it. That's something that they did. I don't think that -- I think if you look at it, and you actually go online, you're a chapter, you're a department, I don't know if they actually changed it because it's kind of -- I've dealt with this in the past when I was a national adjuvant. They kind of did something like that similar, but when the chapters and the departments actually went and did their postcard 990, it was not actually changed on So I'm not sure if -- and I know Jim called and talked to them. I'm not sure, you know, if it's actually a lock in or not, because they are a separate entity so, yeah --

MR. WALLOT: The only other thing with that is 1 2 that we have to file a short 990 for all the chapters or the departments that actually file a 3 4 I do about 15 990s a year. And if you change 5 your fiscal year to a calendar year, vice-versa, you 6 have to file short return. 7 MR. ADKINS: Mr. Chairman? 8 MR. WALLOT: Yes. 9 MR. ADKINS: Chuck Adkins, national adjuvant. 10 Adding on to PNC Rivera's remarks about the -- what 11 the IRS did with the 990s, yeah, I sent out the e-12 mail but so far, every chapter or department that's 13 been submitting their 990s has not had an issue 14 so --15 MR. WALLOT: Okay. 16 MR. ADKINS: It's not -- it's -- apparently it 17 really didn't change. 18 MR. WALLOT: Okay. The other thing I've got 19 under new business here that I had a question about. 20 I got a statement from Morgan Stanley. We do not 21 have a Morgan Stanley account now. Haven't had one 22 for numerous amount of years, and they're saying 23 that they owe us \$0.13 from 1987 or something. 24 just thought I'd bring that up because --25 MR. RIVERA: We don't have an account with



them. Yeah. 1 2 MR. WALLOT: So just -- yeah, we're going to 3 add that to the budget. The \$0.13 we'll probably 4 donate to -- I mean, so far I've gotten three statements from them for a \$0.13 5 6 MR. RIVERA: Well at least they're trying to 7 track us down to give us all that money. 8 MR. WALLOT: Actually, it's from -- yeah. Looks like it's -- I don't even -- I saw it in here 9 10 someplace, but it's seven or eight years old, this 11 stuff, so I will give them a call and just tell them 12 to keep their money. 13 The other thing I've done is -- I'll explain 14 this now, even though -- only because we've got a 15 little time. Last year with our investments, we started with a little over 3 million, \$3,110,06 --16 17 \$3,110,065. We ended up with 3.3, 3.4 million. 18 Bottom line total gain, 524,090.47, which equates to 19 an 18.29 percent rate of return that we've got on 20 the life membership. With that said from what I 21 understand, we're now giving 60 percent to National, 22 40 percent --23

MR. RIVERA: Yeah, 60/40. Yep.

MR. WALLOT: Okay. With that being said,

60/40. Last year, in my sickened state, we split it



24

60/40, and I sent Ernie two separate checks, one for chapters and departments, and we let the rest sit there because we didn't need it and we gained some money. Because of that, when Ernie called me up and said, okay, let's swing the money into the general fund, I also sent the same amount of money, which related to 157,000. That means 40 percent went out and then another 40 percent went out. Therefore, the difference was we shorted the general fund \$78,884.40.

Now, if we look at the loan that we had out there, \$36,000 was paid last year on the loan. loan started as a \$500,000 loan. I paid the 360,000 of it. We had 140,000 left and we're paying that at 2 percent interest. According to the GAAP, General Accounting -- General Accepted Accounting Practices and the IRS, you're not allowed to pay interest to yourself. We have one federal ID number. We can't say we paid interest to this federal ID number and received this interest from federal ID. They can't do that. So if we skip the interest payment that they were paying, and we take off the payments that have been made, and we take off the 78,000, and not give that to the general fund, we would still own -owe on the whole half a million dollar loan,

currently the way -- the last few years I've been

involved with the finances and stuff, and I think it's awesome that we paid it back. That was my year that we borrowed the money because I came into my year as national commander with nothing. PNC Garcia presented it out so that I could try to have some money, and we voted on it, and I got the money. had a really good year. We paid it back. the concerns I have, currently right now, in our general fund, we have 300,000 restricted. We have about 124,000. One of the things that, as the years have gone -- and I checked all the prior years, we're -- we are, this year, 159,000 was sent to the national. When the \$200 is collected up front, \$100 is given to national for operating. Then the other \$100 is put into the investment account, and then -life membership account. Then 60 percent of that is, in turn, given to national when the investment income comes out. So we're sitting with about -cash on hand about \$400,000.

I think it's time that we started helping the departments and chapters because we've seen where it's -- where it's going with this, and national probably could have operated without that 60 percent for the last couple of years. Look, I've been on the national for a number of years now, since about

1	2019. There's no guarantee what's going to happen
2	next year, but I can tell you that there is chapters
3	and departments that I think that if we're giving
4	that amount of money to national, I think that this
5	year we need to consider reversing that and giving

8	MR. WALLOT: Let's stay on one topic at a time
9	here. That's a follow-up. First of all, I want a

So possibly a new 20 investment policy as I was reading these changes in 21 the bylaws, but again, it's -- we're in an 80/20 22 right now, 80 percent equities, 20 percent fixed. 23 The way the market's been, actually the fixed assets 24 last year, we're in the TVA bonds for part of it. 25 Every year the rebate's sent out. We -- I

reallocate the funds to fit into the 80/20 model. Take so much out of the fixed side, take so much out of the investment side, sell the appropriate stocks, stuff like that, only when we need the funds to come out of cash. So again, this goes to bylaws for the investment policy. It's about four pages long. A lot of spaces and big print, so like I said, it's not legalized, but that's what we've been living with.

And with that, I don't think there's any action required except for the bylaw changes, and we'd have to do that. Is there any questions from the finance committee pertaining to the amount of monies that we took in, how they're in invested now? All of these funds are managed except for the one small account that has got four ETFs in it, and the TVA bonds, Tennessee Valley Authority that pays about 5-and-a-Now you can go in with the interest rates that are probably going to drop according to the Fed, 100 percent guarantee, possibly, maybe, unless something drastic happens, probably in February. when they drop the rate, that's supposedly going to increase the housing. The economy's going to pick back up, bond prices are going to fall more. People are going to get back into equities more. Right

now, we've done fairly well in the -- in the ETFs that we're in. We're in the big three plus -- see we're in IT, health, finance, energy. There's 11 sectors in the -- in the S&P. We're in those four, and they're the - usually the highest performing ones. And then everything else is professionally managed and we paid about 80 basis points for the managed equities fund and the rest of the international bonds and things like that. They're a smaller percentages because we have smaller numbers in those. And everybody knows what basis points is, right? Is there a shill in the crowd that knows that?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: It's almost 1 percent.

MR. WALLOT: Four-fifths. And with that, is there any other comments from the finance committee?

MR. RIVERA: Yes, sir. Finance Officer Rivera. So one thing in the -- and I don't know if we could make a motion now so we can bring it onto the floor, but we currently have \$76,960 in a restricted scholarship account. And we have the -- for this incoming year, we have -- there was approved scholarships for 20,000, and it's already done. They've already gone through this stuff. Of course, the budget has to be approved, but the junior vice

was ahead of the game and got all the applications and all that stuff in. Having \$76,000 sitting in a savings account in the bank, I don't think is a very prudent thing to do with our money. I don't know if we could make a motion to -- we cannot spend that money on anything except for scholarships, so if there is a possibility that we could, say, take 50,000 of it and put it into, like, an Edward Jones account or something to where we could actually start building up an investment account for the scholarships, it would eventually pay for itself like the VAVS account.

If we don't do something with that, the money just has to sit in the account. So there's a possibility that we could discuss that and bring it up on the floor. Maybe we don't need to do the full 50. Maybe we could do 30 or 40, but we need to come up with some kind of a number so that we could have our money work for itself because I can tell you, every single restricted account we have now, the money is in a restricted account in the proper place, and it's accounted for. So I mean I think this is kind of towards the Edward Jones thing that they did with the VAVS, but I don't know how we'd go about that.

MR. WALLOT: Was there any special reason the money was not gifted or spent out?

MR. RIVERA: Well, so what it was was that in the audit for 20 -- so in the audit for PNC Felix's year, we had quite a bit of donations for scholarship, but during that year, we didn't -- we -- it was a -- we had a -- an issue with paying the scholarship so the money sat in the account. then each year we had budgeted for the scholarships, so the money has just been there. Then this year, we actually replaced it with the -- we had some extra money that came in on the VAVS. The NEC approved that to replace the money that was paid into it, 15,000 towards this last year's scholarships. So it put the amount back up to 76,000. So if we could maybe do a scholarship for a huge amount, but this would be an excellent opportunity for us to actually start setting up a real scholarship account that could actually start paying for itself and eventually -- we brought in over \$5,000 in application fees so the way this is sitting right here, if we keep replenishing it, but it could be a way for us to actually set up a real scholarship fund.

MR. WALLOT: The other account that we do have

was a bequest 15 years ago possibly where we got \$150,000. It was for the Jones account. That account now is valued a little over -- about 210 after I sent the 30,000 over, and that is in high yield, fairly safe dividend payment stocks. I think they got four down there, 4 to about 6 percent. No matter what the price of the stock is, they got some funds out there \$10 stock that pays a \$1 dividend, but you're looking at 10 percent return on that money. And as interest rates drop, it's in a real estate investment choice, New York office buildings, but it's still paying \$1 a year in dividends on a \$10 stock.

I, personally, have got the -- a chunk of that, and it's -- no matter what happens, your dollar value, it's paid that for the last 12 years. So there's options out there where we're to make a better return on our money, if you want to consider not guaranteed, but the things that are guaranteed today, government bonds, you know, how shaky is the government now. You know, gold funds, things like that, so it all depends what we want to do with it. And like Ernie said, if we move some of this money, the education fund now with the VAVS fund, we have evolved since then. We've lost our VAVS programs

basically. We still have people that are working in 1 2 hospitals, at least in the State of Michigan. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yeah. Arkansas. 3 4 MR. WALLOT: So we've got the funds there and 5 it was supposed to be set up for the candy stripers 6 that work in the hospital. That was the main 7 purpose of those dollars, and I don't think we've 8 given anything in the last --9 MR. RIVERA: No. No. We haven't. 10 MR. WALLOT: -- four or five years. That's why 11 the fund has grown. Right now --UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: The VA shut the program 12 13 down during COVID, so that was a --14 MR. WALLOT: Yeah. And right now, it takes in 15 about \$8,000 a year in dividends, so that was going 16 to be the scholarship money that was going to go out 17 of it where we kept our balance, but since we 18 haven't spent it, now it's up to about 210, 19 something like that. Okay. Any other questions from 20 the committee? 21 MR. J. ANDERSON: Yeah. Jim Anderson. 22 Referring back to what Ernie was talking about 23 pulling monies out of the scholarship fund and 24 putting it into an investment fund, I'm debating 25 whether we should make the motion within our



committee to carry it forward to the body looking into it, saying moving 30,000 or 40,000 across into an investment like Edward Jones, and leaving, you know, maybe 30,000 in the account, just as a backup.

MR. WALLOT: Edward Jones is going to charge us, probably 2.5 percent, 2-and-a-quarter percent with the right stock through Jones. We can go into a self-directed investment portfolio with Chase, and they won't charge us anything, but that means we or I or someone is going to say, these are the stocks we pick. Jones charges us 2.5 percent to say, you're taking this stock. Cut. So do we want to put in a professional manager in this, or do we want to do it ourselves? With 40 grand if you're making 10 percent on your money, you're making \$4,000 a year. If we -- if we move 70, or 50, or 60, that all depends what we're going to give out in scholarships.

MR. ANDERSON: Well, the upcoming budget, you're scheduling 20,000 to go out so that's going to put it down to 50. So that's why I was thinking 30 or 40,000. We've got 5,000 to go back into that account, so that just leaves a little bit of available cash in there, but on the investment side, we can invest that 30 or 40,000.

And same thing, they're offering a hand to help us. And again, same thing, there's not any cost to us for them having their service officers on there. So that's another positive way of some of the things that got accomplished.

PCI was another sore subject for some people and some people didn't mind that, but that's the book that goes out with all the Purple Heart recipients that were going to do a digital version that was on it. And one of the things that the said as we voted through, we did not vote to approve that to move forward because it took us -- I forgot the finding officers led, but it took us almost four years to collect the last payment that they were to do for us. And that was only \$50,000. And even then, they couldn't pay it all up front. So that was \$10,000 out of whack. So that took almost, you know, two months to get that

2 Another thing we got accomplished was AUSA. 3 We'll probably be playing some videos on that. that we're associate partner program with the AUSA 5 program. One of the other things we did was we adjusted the budget. We did it twice this year. Once we did that was in reference to we had to get money in for our scholarships that we ended up having to pay for last year. Plus, we also had to put money into programs to support our software educational training and our suicide awareness. So we moved \$30,000 from our VAVS account to help cover with these programs. The other time we had to do on the budget is we had to come up with Constant Contact had raised the price that we had on that and Google Workspace. So we're talking almost a 40 percent increase on the payments of what we were supposed to have. So that was a couple times where we had to change to move the budget so that gets things done.

And that's the vision we have. And that's how we go get it.

Yeah, it's a -- it's a -- I know I got Ernie sitting up there. He's laughing going, man, I never heard of this. That's what I like about it because me and the secretary of VA, we talked about it.

They may even start trying to buy this program from us. And we're totally digital. We're inside the actual system of the VA. But looking at the big picture of that, the Purple Heart is set on top of

that altogether. So it was a representation of the Purple Heart as well. So it brought -- we didn't have a full steam service program, but we are tied to Congress through our service program. Folks keep on forgetting that. Without our family of the service program, we'd lose our seat at the table in Congress. That's how we came online from the start.

We need to get back into the National Parade as well. Because we're Purple Heart, they will -- I guarantee you they will give us a seat at the table for free because we part of the committee as well in Washington, D.C. So showing our colors is showing that we're here and we're not gone. We're not dead. We're the most honorable folks out there, whether you like it or not. And I feel honored when I have a national man, a national senior vice, and a national junior vice is doing the job of the whole team, and all of us. It's a team effort. remember that -- those few words. That's inside me. And that's the communication I had coming back. know, we could always back line with guys like the VFW and all this stuff, but it's all about our It's all about our presence to the people. They don't look at VFW. They look at VFW by a segment on the side, but they always look up to the

MR. GRAY: Keith Gray for Credentials. I just wanted to go over this real quick. I'm working on transposing the delegate counts that were in the delegate book that went out. Building C is -- right now they're actually in the process of trying to remodel some of it that was

there. So one thing about it, that contract is still good. So that's still going to be for another three years or four years. I think that was the first year. Yeah, I'm sorry. Yeah, for four years. So with that, that's going to turn around and bring some revenue coming in.

And then, as we also did that, one of the things, as we talked in the finance meeting, I got rid of our boat anchors of copiers up there. And that was a -- account. So now we got a new copier, and a lot less appliance, and one of the fastest and easier print ones that was here for -- so now the office ladies don't have to sit around and wait for copies, and then it's a great tool for us. And then actually, I hate say this. They even gave us \$2,000 to get off the contract, so that's so good. So I always wanted to pay you and get something faster, and you got it cheaper. You did something good, so thank you. Yes, sir?

MR. ARNOLD: Commander, Phil Arnold. I came in after -- ADC, Pennsylvania Region. One, I came in right after the roll call. I'd like the record to show that I'm present.

MR. FERGUSON: Duly noted. Thank you, Commander.

Oh, first of all, it's nice to be back 7 in charge of the ROTC. I had it for ten years, and 8 now I have it back again. A number of things really 9 need to happen as we -- as we move forward. One, I 10 think we need to get back to the point where the 11 recipient schools or the departments or the 12 chapters, are not paying for the awards. One of our 13 things that was really critical over the years, 14 would set us apart from everybody else, was the fact 15 that the award did not cost a recipient's school. 16 When I left it two years ago, we had 3,700 member 17 schools plus. I'm not sure where we are right now. 18 Just because of the accounting process, it's not the 19 same. 20 The other thing that we really need to look at 21 is we need to stop using the ROTC award for the 22 Badge of Merit. It's not the same, and it doesn't 23 signify the same. And in my report, I did list, 24 with the help of a good gentleman in Florida, a

rebate for the Badge of Merit, which would be able

to be able to use with Sea Scouts, like the gentleman who had friends that were meeting us at the airport. Our young Marines, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts. It is a very, very important award. So we need to get back online and move forward. And we can talk about these things later, but I just really want to express my thank you for bringing me back. And I really appreciate it.

MR. FERGUSON: Roger, thank you. Give a couple comments on what he made. And one of the things it was never ever forced that the chapter or the department ever paid for reports. It was actually making the ROTC units go through them, so that way we have a chapter or a department to be there. So a lot of these awards were shipped to the school, and nobody was there. So now we're trying to get our contact out. So that was the purpose of that, not to have a chapter of that. So even if a school wanted to do the -- if they didn't have the funds that -- on that, if the schools could turn around and pay it for their self, you know. And that's hardship.

And like Roger said, I would love that we could turn around and get enough money into the program, and that we can have that. So long story short, you

know, just to get that up and going, that's going to cost at least 50,000 a year to turn around and make sure that we have money in the program to keep this up and going on the current way we're doing it. But we do have some proposals coming up later, is to talk about how we can save some money because, as we know, this is not anything that's not been going up in the last few years. One thing I continue to do is that ROTC program, that \$20 has not changed in the last three or four years. So think about that. So we've tried to keep it at that to do the best we can, but the costs of everything goes in there.

Badge of Merit. Yes, I think that's a good thing we need to do. One of the things we need to also do, and we have to remember, how many people know that, you know -- reiterate this, ROTC is a national program. That's one of the things on that. We can't have a chapter or a department go and print their own certificates and things on this because this is a national program. We have medals that's out there. If we have some people that decide that they're going to do this because they don't want to pay the \$20, and they're going to give them a coin. One of the problems you have is now these kids will go to a summer camp or go to the school, and they're

Well, I got that because I got an award -- the leadership award from the Military Order of the Purple Heart. Well, that's a nice metal, and you got a ribbon that's on there. Well, I got the same thing, but I only got a certificate and the coin. There's no uniformity on that.

That's why we have to have the standard, and we can't change from that. These awards are actually approved by the ROTC national level at each one, whether it's Army, Air Force, Marines, that's their -- where they came in here. So that's why we want to keep -- make sure to keep the uniformity of those.

So again, Roger's bringing up some great ideas.

I want to make sure that we move these things

forward, but we've got to have that. Yes, sir?

MR. NEWALL: Let me just add a couple of things. You all know what the ROTC award is, but most -- many people don't know what the Badge of Merit program is or when it started. Basically, the Badge of Merit was started to remember the original Badge of Merit from 1782. It is not the same. And that's one of the things that, really, we need to think about. When I came on board a number of years ago, one of the problems we had was people getting

more than one award, or they're not getting an award at all. And the ROTC award, you can only receive one in your high school years, or one in your college years. You can't receive two. You can't give a -- an ROTC award to a Sea Scout organization because it's not part of the ROTC recognized program. So that's why I created the Badge of Merit about five years ago. Granted, the award material that I used was quick and dirty. It definitely needs to get upgraded to our -- what our current system is.

But I want people to understand that they're really -- they're very, very much two different awards, and they go to two different type of groups. And it's these small, minor organizations, like Land Cadets, Sea Cadets, things like that, that are very important for people that are involved with it. And we need to be able to give them something from my order to recognize their accomplishments, and who they are, and let them wear the -- these awards just like we would the ROTC award. So that's -- thank you very much.

MR. FERGUSON: Thanks, Roger. Raymond?

MR. WETZEL: Good morning, Commander. Raymond

Wetzel, Senior Vice, Department of California.



You're talking about the -- cutting costs, and we're moving forward into the new future of digital services. I personally call upon membership a lot to assist in finding records. It would be really advantageous. If we could have access, as department officers, to the archives to locate missing charters, missing election reports, missing 990s, to get information for either closed or restarted chapters. And it would really be helpful to us in that aspect. So that is the request that possible to opening up the archives of the digital service to your department officers.

MR. FERGUSON: So two things about that,
Raymond, real quick, is all those archives are
actually into the Google Drive. So we have to have
that. You have to have a purpleheart.org e-mail to
get in that. So that -- and each one of those per
person that's on that, a month costs us \$25 or 35.

It did bump back up. So to add each one of that,
that would run our budget way up. So that's why the
charters and the information on that. But you do
have, through the website, to get your current
information that's on there, and then that's some of
the things that's there.

So I know you're dealing with California,



obviously with the several chapters that not turned in the election reports, and it's been for a few years. And I know it's hard to get those. What we can do is once you do that, to get that to us so we can get that to the webmaster, and the webmaster could turn around and send the things through here. So -- okay. So -- and I greatly agree with you. Thank you for bringing that up.

MR. WETZEL: Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Right. So when we go with that, he would just want to remind you, we do have what we call as a webmaster e-mail that's on that. But all this needs to be funneled towards the senior vice or who's actually in charge of the web that -- each year because the commander can do that. Before we go, I want to bring up that we have two people that's online, and it's Larry Leighton, and then we got the department commander, Jennifer Horn, from Washington, that's on there. Yes. Go ahead.

MR. HONERKAMP: Fred Honerkamp, Michigan Senior Vice. There's some strategic issues that we need to face. One is lack of new members. One is declining participation in by existing members, and the third major one is financing. The fact that we have to talk at the national meeting about getting two



computers and a printer tells us the state of affair that we're in. It -- it denies the management of this organization, the ability to go forward when we're putting down little fires. What is the status of our relationship with the foundation, and how can we address those three critical issues?

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, sir. Okay. of the foundation. Everybody has turned around and every time I've been towards the order, we've had some, we'll say positive and negative things about the foundation. We know what happened with all the grievance. We've known. We've gone through the I don't think any of the last few past lawsuits. commanders have ever had a meeting with the foundation. I can tell you this, one thing about it, I did have a meeting with the foundation, with the team at the headquarters. The reason why I had a meeting I was right there to find exactly what you just said. The first thing they asked us is what do we want? We didn't ask for anything, did we? didn't ask for anything going on with that. All through the two-hour meeting with them, that's all they asked. I'll tell you who was there. That was past national commander Neil Van-Ess.

MR. RIVERA: I want to address you. You came up with the issue on finances about the computer, and the computers and the printers and stuff. you look at the finance report that we submitted in there, you know, currently the headquarters and the finance stuff that we currently have, the organization is not bleeding and hurting for money. So if anybody thinks that it is, it's not, okay? Because we set up where 60 percent of the life member rebate goes to the headquarters. currently right now, in -- in the general account for the MOPH, we have almost \$300,000 in the account, and we have \$131,000 in restricted money, okay? So the issue is, how do we continue to move forward and set up programs that bring us income. This year, if you look at the report, we had \$133,000 that was donated in requests this year. the critical thing is looking at the budget, looking at the stuff that we're going to be doing, moving forward. The building is -- the building currently is rented out, so we're getting an income of about 34,000 a year. The -- the legacy program brings in \$17,000 a year. The little website things that pops up on there brings us almost \$6,000 a year. is small programs that are doing that.

You know, as a -- as the body, what we need to be asking as the incoming leaders, what is your plan to get us to the point where we can raise money so that the rebate can go back to what we and the chapters and the departments are doing, the heavy lifting. So currently there's \$200 is paid in life membership. \$100 is given to the headquarters. \$100 is given to the life member investment account, which they invest. And then when the rebate comes out, the national headquarters gets 60 percent of the rebate. So they're essentially getting a huge portion of that money. So through -- over the last few years -- and I can tell you all the books, everything is reconciled. It's all online now. these are real numbers. If anybody wants to look, I'll pull up the QuickBooks online or the bank accounts and show you because we did that this year.

What needs to happen is, is that we need to start electing leaders that have the ability to understand what a business is. We are a business.

We're a nonprofit, but we're a business. We cannot -- we cannot -- people are not going to donate money to us unless we're actually doing something to help. I think this year we did not provide any money out to Patriots for any kind of assistance. We did do

one thing, we sponsored somebody who's going to be doing the National Triathlon that made it to the nationals. So as far as money wise, I think it's a question for the body to ask the incoming leaders, what is your plan to move us forward? I think that we're in a whole different place. It looks like we're going to be paying off — the loan back this year, so that's the question we should be asking.

I think it's up to the body to make a decision and the leaders that you've picked, what is the future going to be? Because we're not doing bad, I'm telling you, we're not. We're not doing bad. We're not doing great, but we're a lot better than 2019 when me and PNC Garcia got there, and we were 1.54 million negative. that, so if you look at where we did a budget, 90
percent of our budget is actually going from

You know, and again, I know we talked about the fund, we need to get some people that's in the fund that will help us manage and get the things for -- that has the ideas in the charisma to get it through there. We have the region commanders in there, I'm not knocking any of them down, but we need some help that was in there. They are the boards that decide what the programs are to move forward and that's how this has got to happen. So I know later on, we'll get a little fund report. You-all seen to -- what the fund generated this year. It's same thing that's having this -- structure that's on here.

So again, we've got to promote ourself so people know who the Military Order of the Purple Heart -- you know, we've increased a little bit on our social media, and that's been doing well for us, but social media is only just part of the programs, you know? I have one individual Patriot that's -- I think he's in this room talking about maybe doing a commercial for us, and I think that is something

that we definitely got to have that's on here. So I've had the junior vice talk and link up with this individual so we can get this information out and figure out how we can move forward. That's the way we can look at this.

I mean, we got more donations this year, and I think that was one of the things, not just in the request, but we did have some online donations because we would get the word out and that's how we're going to do a few things. Yes, sir?

MR. WERTHEIM: Hi. Craig Wertheim, Department of Florida. So -- this convention, so it was -- money was raised by small individuals, but I had the opportunity to meet with a very high net worth individual that donates well over \$1 million a year in different organizations, Top of Towers, Wounded Warrior Project, and such, where he gives an upwards of hundreds of thousands of dollars to. And I sat with him over lunch and he, like the commander said, pulled up our financials. And he said to me, "Craig, I'd love to write you a check right now for \$50,000 at the convention, and I was prepared to do that until my accountant showed me your rating in -- in the Charity Navigator," and my accountant said, "You can't do this because it'll screw up your" --

however it looks to the IRS and how you give your money. And he said, "Once you get your things in order, I'll be happy to come back to you and work with you guys," he goes. But, he said, "It'll just mess up how you donate your money and how it looks in your financials." And I left that meeting very depressed because I thought I was -- it was a sure thing.

And this guy, you know, he works for one of the biggest builders in the United States and has a yacht, has a private plane. He's a -- but he's a down to earth guy and he's no BS. We've got to get ourselves in order in terms of, you know, getting that ratio down to under 5 percent in terms administrative, of course, costs to the expenses, and getting that money back out to where it needs to go. We do it at the chapters. We do it at the departments. We've got to do it at the administration.

And that doesn't mean that we don't pay our employees, and we -- we need the employees. We need more employees, but somehow we've got the tail wagging the dog as opposed to the dog wagging the tail and it -- it's got to get fixed. And we've got to get smarter, how we're doing things. And I know

that command team is working hard at it, but we -we've got to work harder getting money in at the
national level. They -- we can't be relying on the
money that's invested and not have large donors. It
-- it's crazy that the Military Order of the Purple
Heart, we're the -- we're the ultimate wounded
warriors in the nation, and people would rather give
to other organizations of wounded warriors and not
give to us. That's all, sir.

MR. FERGUSON: Major Jackson. Oh, are you yielding?

MR. JACKSON: Yes.

MR. FERGUSON: Okay.

MR. JACKSON: To kind of piggyback and I'm asking this for Financial Officer Ernie and also the commander for the rating that we have Charity
Navigator, so everybody understands, it's not MOPH.

It's coming from the foundation. So my question is this, how do we change that as an order? You know, because we really didn't have any financials that anybody was dealing with. So how do we go forward in trying to change that rating when it really wasn't the order because the order didn't have any monies at that point. Everything was based on the foundation. And of course, everybody thinks the

foundation is MOPH and it wasn't.

MR. RIVERA: Let's let -- Finance Officer Let me -- let me answer that question. currently, if you look at the budget that we have right now, what we currently have, what we spent this year, if you look at the total dollars that we brought in, the total dollars that we actually provided for the programs, us, if you look at the report and I can sit down and show you the report, we're still, even as an organization, a huge portion of what the money we spend is on administrative Even us, it's not just the foundation. so, one of the things that is difficult when we have programs, we have suicide awareness programs, we have all these different programs, we're not spending on those programs. It shows in a budget, but then when it goes to the -- to the line item and there's nothing there, when we fill out the 990s, when we submit all of our documentation and people look at that, that's why it's critical that we can bring the money in. We have enough money here now to pay for the lights, pay for a couple of staff members to go to Washington and do these few little things we're doing. The programs are the things that have to be pushed because we're not providing -- if



you look at the percentage of money that we bring in, the percentage of money that we put out in our program -- so you think about this year, we did 17,500 in scholarships is what we paid out, and we did -- the ROTC program cost us \$27,000. So if you add those two together, about 35,000, we spent around 600-and-something-thousand. What percent of that is in programs? Real easy, about five, maybe 8 percent of this right here, the order. Until we turn that and we start putting money into programs, if we had somebody that donated money and they donated \$50,000, and we spent that full \$50,000 on a program, guess what? Now that's going for the program.

MR. JACKSON: Okay. So we got to do a better idea -- a better job on what we're --

MR. RIVERA: We do. So if you step up and become the suicide awareness or whatever it is that you're -- you want to be a part of, any of the service programs and stuff like that, when the order -- so the thing with the foundation is, the foundation would bring in right now, currently, about 22 million. It costs them 21 million to bring in \$22 million, that's why they're F rated. So currently, right now, what does it cost us to bring

in 600-and-something-thousand dollars -- 620,000 to bring in 650,000? We're no different because we have to revamp the way that our programs are. So we need to have where the money that comes in has to be spent out on programs. That's the critical thing. That's where donors are going to give you money. Anybody that -- I know there's some people in here that run non-profits, you got to go in there and say you're going to give me \$50,000. I'm going to spend 49,000 of that on the program, and we're going to use 1,000 of that for, you know, printing out things and administrative stuff.

MR. FERGUSON: Okay.

MR. EGGELSTON: Commander, I'm, like -- I'm getting to fall in love with Ernie just a little bit because he --

MR. FERGUSON: What happens after the convention or after we close, that's in between him and --

MR. EGGELSTON: Charles, I just -- yeah. Yeah. On the golf -- on the golf course, yeah. I'm beginning to like Ernie a little bit more because he took the word out of my mouth. And I'm going to make a simple case. Commander from Florida, here's the deal. Felix Garcia, when he was running and

became a national commander. What did you do, Felix? You came to me because you know I'm sponsored by AT&T and Dell. Computers -- I'll kill you. computers at you all day long. And what did they They turned around and cut us two checks. One do? for 10,000, do what you want to do, another -- it's a donation, another ten more thousand to do what they had to do for the convention. It should -- it had nothing to do with the rating at that point because they wanted to give because I have a personal connection. All right. If you in love with me, and you believe in me, and you know I'm a Purple Heart recipient, you're going to do this because it's the Convention of Purple Heart Recipients. You're not doing it because your accountant said it ain't the right thing to do, or you want to wag the dog's tail the other way, or whatever the case is. You doing it because it's the right thing to do at the point, and it's a write off.

Same thing with FedEx. You know, I have FedEx ready to donate in a different operation coming up, but at the same token, this FedEx -- the founder is a two-time Purple Heart recipient. Me and Fred talk all the time. So remember that. It's -- it is all about what they want to do. It's -- it's a

simple write off. And that 20K wasn't anything for Matter of fact, they stroke the check and ask Felix to come and pick it up from the headquarters in Dallas at that time. It was a Dallas convention, matter of fact. And I think he ran down and did it, and we threw a big party. It's all about relationships. Don't ever let anything discourage you from -- with your sponsorships. And that's what we need to get to. Personal connection to sponsorships. If I'm doing commercials with these guys, and I'm doing entities, I'm speaking on a tour with these guys, then they will give back because it's a personal relationship. They see what we do. It's not about me. It's about the team of all of us. So you know, Ernie, when I get on the golf course, I'm going to hit you with the club. I'm not going to even give you the stroke. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: I surely appreciate that. Okay. That one of the things, we had a comment from online is to remind everybody that the MOPH is not a 501(c)(3), we're a 501(c)(19). So that's why when we're getting donations and things here, it needs to go through the MOPH fund because they are the 501(c)(3) because that's one of the big things about the -- who have some money to donate to you, that's

where they want to look at. Until -- one of the things we ought to do, and we're talking about legislative things, why don't we push that through that all the BSOs will be -- are -- as 501(c)(19)s can get the same recognition as a 501(c)(3). Why can't we do that? So that's something that we need to look forward and get on with that.

I will talk real quick before I get to you, Patriot, in reference to programs. And one of the things -- my failure was to communicate with the part of the program chairs, and the reason why, I've asked for how to run the program. What we need to do, what your future is going to be and that's on How are we going to afford this? So we use a program, say we're going to do some training in through the order. What does it cost of train an individual? So say it's \$50 or \$100, where do we start that at? Whether it's at a chapter level or a department level, take that number and say, hey, we want to do ten per department. We know we got 43 departments. You start multiplying that out, now you've got something where they're going to come back in and put this out. So we turn around and say, hey, here's where we're going at. So we want to say maybe in the program we want to run 100,000

So like I said, part of that, I've tried to work with that, and hopefully, we can get some of this communication going forward with each and every one so we can move forward on these programs because that's a strong thing that we got to do. And then we got to promote when we do something. Again, a lot of people don't know all the things that the Military Order of the Purple Heart does. And it's not just what we do with other groups, it's what the Military Order of the Purple Heart does. We partner in with a lot of people that's out here, we have to make these things the Military Order of the Purple Heart.

My wife doesn't laugh. So you -- don't feel obligated to laugh. I just -- I'm sitting back there, and I always think if you have a seat at the table, you should have a voice at the table. So I just had a couple thoughts.

And the very last thing I was going to mention, just because I think it's a big one, when we're talking about advertising outside of the real world, a lot of people don't know we exist unless you are a member. A very simple one that I think national can really help with and build out because it's free, and we love free, public service announcements. you make a set of public service announcements, you can launch out to the departments and the chapters, we can reach out to the local radio and use the preapproved spots that they throw in for free when they have a break in radio time and they'll just go, yeah, there's your 30 seconds, and now the public around the nation, for free, is hearing about the Military Order of the Purple Heart, what we do, and who we serve. And there might be an up upfront cost of getting those recordings made or whatever that may be, but heck, I have I Love Radio right down the road from me, right? I have the local Christian radio right on the other side of where I work. There's a lot of options out there where we can just drop off the PSA. And now, you have your memberships building, you know, awareness for us without us

costing a dime out of pocket. And, you know, the public in that local area is suddenly going like, oh, wow, there is an Military Order of the Purple Heart. It is out here doing great things in our neck of the woods, not just when we see them on TV on Capitol Hill, I'm hearing about it when I'm driving, you know, through the tunnels in Pittsburgh. So just want to throw it out there. If we added a line, I really recommend getting some PSAs you can launch out with us to drop off in our local neighborhoods.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Appreciate it. You can speak, Taylor.

MR. TAYLOR: Thank you, Commander for recognition. Commander Fred Taylor. I think we failed to recognize the assets that we have as an organization, and here's what I mean by that. Nine or ten years ago, when things disintegrated with the foundation, many people were like, we're done.

We're cooked. And I said to everyone that would listen we have advantages that the foundation can never have. They don't have membership. They do not have a chapter level organization. They do not have a department level organization. They do not have a regional organization. They can never have

those things. We have that in place. We have not utilized the assets we have right at our disposal all this time to overcome the deficits. They had the car program and other things. We also didn't have a 501(c)(3) or a (c)(19), which, as a veterans' organization is a different thing. We should have immediately gone for 501(c)(3) I think, because we had lost our 501(c)(3) and made it available to us. But we are not assessing correctly what our advantages are and taking advantage of them. Art of War, Sun Tzu says clearly, you assess your enemy. They're not our enemy, but you assess your enemy in the book, then you make adjustments to focus on your strengths and focus on their weaknesses. Our strengths is right here, this group right here, and we -- I got a lot more. I could say a lot more, but you get the gist of what I think. Commander, we have things they can never have, and it is right here. Thank you so much. MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. All right. Nick McIntosh? MR. MCINTOSH: Nick McIntosh, National Historian. 501(c)(19). (c)(19) is a subparagraph -- is a

subparagraph that for nonprofits. (c) (19) was

dedicated exclusively for veterans' organizations. The trouble with raising money and 501(c)(3) and (c)(19), everybody knows (c)(3) is tax-deductible. Nobody knows (c)(19) is, and the problem therein lies, the fact that since they both give to somebody they don't know about. That's the reason the (c)(19) isn't working. So the 501(c)(3) is the way to go.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you.

MR. CANNON: I want to do a privilege statement. The last patriot that got up. As I look out over the groupings here, a lot of us are beige. And last year after the convention, when I went back home, I was trying to see how I could be a part of the Military Order of the Purple Heart and the legacy that I'm leaving. Now, we are talking about finances. Let me just tell you what happened a couple of months ago. I realized that in the aging process, I need to work quick. So I went to and was invited to the Dover Air Force Base Mortuary. I am an ordained bishop, and I was invited.

During that process, I wore my Purple Heart colors. Meeting with the base chaplain and the dignitaries that were there and other ministerial folk at the mortuary, they gave me a tour around the entire mortuary, and they explained the process. As



-- in the three hours -- more than three hours that we were there, I got invited to take part when one of our military personnel were deceased. I am now getting ready to go to their school -- or their introductory school of how I can be a part of that process, so that door has opened. And now I'm looking at when we do have a combat wounded veteran, I can take part in that from a voluntary position. Meeting, greeting, and taking care of the families, the loss.

There are two more mortuaries that I know of, one in Hawaii and there's one in Japan. We who are there in those areas, we can take part in that also to make a point. There's things that we can do to get the popularity of the Military Order of the Purple Heart to where people will want to donate to us. We also have a situation where there -- where we're having a problem recruiting them. I have a plan that we can recruit, but it's a slow process because we are in competition. There's competition there, so to speak. And I use that term for lack of another.

You know, I look at the Wounded Warriors and the other programs that are gaining a lot of attention. I remember years ago, in the '80s, when I

joined the Purple Heart, we had a lot of attention. And I'm trying to figure out where that went. And then if we go back to nine years or so, we see that we come -- our reputation was kind of damaged. But here we are now, 21st -- we can do something about that. So I challenge you, why not get involved and not be afraid to let folk know in our social groupings, we are combat-wounded veterans. Let -- chest out. I go into Lowe's, and Home Depot, and stores, and things of that nature, I -- I'm taken aback with people who salute you and et cetera, et cetera. And I have an opportunity to explain to them and let them know here we are. I'm finding that this is one of the ways that we all can take part, all of us. All of us.

The church organization that I'm involved with, over 8 million members, trust me when I'm up in front of them, they know that I'm a combat-wounded veteran. They know that, without a shadow of a doubt. And I have a couple of regions that are going -- after this convention that we just had in Indianapolis last week, there's a couple of regions that are going to take part in supporting the Military Order of the Purple Heart. Yes, God is working. We are praying. We are doing things. And

whatever we do, let's keep our foot to the pedal, let's do what we can do, and I guarantee you we're going to come ahead of this thing. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, Chaplain. We know we're doing good when he's got God on our side, right? And that's going to turn around and keep things up. Department Commander, Keller.

And the invoice was also sent before to be approved so that we -- I could bring materials here for the convention so that other people can take it to their areas because we're coming up on the suicide prevention month --

MR. FERGUSON: Sure.

MS. KELLER: -- where we should be -- you know, whoever is going to take this program next should have a good start with that, and --

MR. FERGUSON: So the -- so the answer I owe to you, that's here, obviously, I don't think we had any problem with the money being spent out of the account. But number one, it was all at the last minute. And it wasn't the decision made by me that I can contact it with the senior vice, Junior Vice, the finance officer and the -- about this. The key thing, what we're looking at, yes, I think this would be a great thing to have if we had this, like at the first year, so then that way, we can turn

around and put this out, and put it out even if it went to, say, January, six months later, as we're coming in. The hardship is -- can I ask this other question? How many other people do we have across the order that's actually -- could be a counselor, could be trained. Is there anybody on that?

MS. KELLER: I don't know right now because I have requested assistance. I have -- every convention somebody says I'll contact you. I do this. I do that. I know people are doing in their -- little groups out there. Other people are connected to other organizations. And they do it. A lot of people reach out to me, but it's usually on a case-to-case basis --

MR. FERGUSON: Sure.

MS. KELLER: -- where I've spoken to a lot of individuals and get them -- given them resources.

I've always been looking for people all over the nation to be a part of the program. The chaplains should be a part of the program because they are a great resource for this. And we do have social workers, peer support specialists. We have them all over. People call me as individuals, but people do not want -- have not been a part of a committee.

That would be optimal.

MR. FERGUSON: So --

MS. KELLER: However, right now we're talking about the money. It's about three years. I've always asked. And you -- you've explained to me because I did ask you as soon as you moved over, how do we do this? And everybody says, well, you don't understand, or this is the way, or that's not how it should be done. But nobody tells me how it can. All I'm saying is, right now I can't do anything for the past. I hope that you can do better for the future.

MR. FERGUSON: So again, appreciate your comments s on that. One of the things, that's why I was asking how we could do better for the future, is having this out. As soon as you get finished from this, if -- we'll say, if you were stepping up as the suicide awareness director next year, have that program, have that in front of us, and tell how you want to do this.

You know, you asked me about one thing we had in South Dakota, and you were asking about the funds that was raised off the airplane auction. So those funds are still there. They're actually in -- in the MOPH funds. So they're sitting there. So that's restricted. So out of the 5,000 that we had



this year for that, there was nothing ever spent.

And you asked one thing about if that rolls over.

No. That's why we approve the budget every year at that amount, whatever it happens to be. And that comes from the program chairs so they can do that.

So again, you -- your help for us to help you succeed, because this is a passion program for all of us that's on here, is the turnaround and have that out for us.

MS. KELLER: So if it's out there -- I provided the same thing I provided in -- when I was in West Virginia, the sheet that I provided to Robert was the same sheet. I just provided it again because Robert wasn't in that group at the time, in West Virginia. And actually, my mistake, the auction happened in North Dakota.

MR. FERGUSON: Correct.

MS. KELLER: But the money was there. I asked for that too, and nobody knew where it was until just a couple of days ago when I got explained where the money for the auction went. However, I'm still asking when a money's spent in a program, why doesn't -- isn't the chair aware. I wasn't able to access any money to buy any materials. When I teach classes, whatever group I teach, they're paying for

their own materials, which is okay. I just want branded merchandise so that we could advertise just, let's say, like the legion advertises their program.

And also, I would like to know if there's a program and there's a chair to that program, when there's money moved around from the program, why is it that the chair knows nothing? We're not supposed to know? Because I'm requesting money now that isn't there.

MR. FERGUSON: So again, I asked this one question, and I guess I don't know if we're communicating. I never knew anything about anybody else being trained into the program. And I asked that. So we're going to go buy silicone bracelets, ink pens, and things on this, and how many people do we have that's trained to going to move this program out? We're buying information that's on this to get things out to the individuals. I understand that, and I think it's important, but I think we need to have trained people. It doesn't need to be one person in the military or the Purple Heart. You say you're training people. I have no list of anybody that's trained, or we know anything on this. So how do we promote the program?

MS. KELLER: I didn't say I train people.



They're give -- they're given briefing and suicide 1 2 awareness classes. These are people that are out there to be peers, just to know how to talk to 3 4 people. Remember, we cannot train --5 MR. FERGUSON: Correct. 6 MS. KELLER: -- experts or, you know --7 MR. FERGUSON: Or counselors. 8 MS. KELLER: -- social workers or anything 9 else. So it's -- this -- the training or the 10 briefings are for the general public, just to be 11 comfortable in speaking to other people. 12 MR. FERGUSON: Correct. 13 MS. KELLER: And that's all. And maybe that's 14 why people haven't come out because they think, oh, 15 now I'm going to have to go and do these classes. 16 It's just for you to be comfortable to speak to 17 another patriot, to your peer, to your child, to 18 anybody. Last year's portion was sent -- not sent to 20 the general fund as required, so we're going to --21 we voted to pay off the loan completely this year 22 out of the monies that are going to come from the 23 Life Membership Fund for a total. 24 Okay. Thank you. And no surprise there. We



25

voted on the overages, there were a few, but the

total budget was under for the year. An explanation was given by the finance officer on all of the overages and accepted by the Finance Committee and voted on. Per line item, like I said, the budget was under for the year. Total for the investment, last year, we made \$524,090.47. If we look at our 60/40 split, national is going to get \$314,000, chapters and departments -- what does that say, Danny?

MR. GREEN: 209.

MR. WALLOT: \$209 -- \$209,000. That money -yes, that money will be available as soon as we need
it, as soon as it's figured out. And we'll just
proportionally sell the stocks and fixed instruments
that we have in the investment that equal out our
80/20 position that we have with the Life Membership
Fund. Right now, we've got three separate accounts.
We've got one equity fund, which is 80 percent of
our money, one fixed, which is 20 percent of our
money. We've got another account that has got four
ETFs in it and a Tennessee Valley Authority bond
issued, that -- those could be cashed in at any
time.

We've got a checking account with approximately \$38,000 in it. That is money that is sent from the



headquarters, and basically, it's just a transfer fund. We have to keep \$15,000 in there to receive all the free services that we do from Chase Manhattan Bank and JP Morgan. The loan will be paid off this year then, the monies will be -- come in spent, 524,000 going out. Last year, we made 18.29 percent on our money.

MR. J. ANDERSON: Wow.

MR. FERGUSON: That's very good.

MR. WALLOT: And that was the managed funds and the equities. Most of the fixed instruments last year did very poorly because they were in bonds that were purchased five, and ten, and three years ago at a 2 percent interest rate. So if you buy a \$1,000 bond back then, 2 percent was the going rate, and you try to sell it today, well, nobody is going to buy a bond to get 2 percent on it when they can get a new one that pays 5 or 6 percent. So therefore, they have to discount the bond price. So like a \$1,000 bond, you may only be able to sell it for \$850, so we took a loss on some of that stuff. The actual return on the -- on the fixed side of it, plus what we took out of that last year, we were down about \$150,000 on the fixed side. That was only 20 percent of our money that we were up

tremendously on the equity side because of AI and a bunch of other stuff that went right.

Except for that -- and that, unless there's any questions is the finance report or at least the Life Membership -- Life Membership Fund for you all. Are there any questions?

MR. MILTON: Chairman, could you expand on the -- on the loan, I think -- I'm sure a lot of people in this room don't understand what we're talking about by repaying the loan?

MR. WALLOT: At the mic, please.

THE REPORTER: Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: The question was, is you wanted to -- Dennis Wallot to explain what the loan was from the Life Membership that we, as the order are repaying back, and that was from Patriot Doug Milton. Well, now, you know, you're making it worse. He's got his glasses, out now we get the real numbers.

MR. WALLOT: This is the CPI report and the PPI report that comes with the 428 basis points followed through, that's Econ 101, if you've ever taken that class, and that's coffee in Brazil as well.

The loan -- we took out a loan for \$480,000 in 2019 -- 2020. We owed the bank about 300,000 that

was borrowed that no one knew about. We had to pay off the hotel in Branson. There was other bills that were outstanding. I wired the money directly from our account to the pay -- payees, it did not go through the finance officer because at that time I would have had to send it into the WCE as well as our current adjutant at that time. So we owed \$480,000. We took out a loan. That year in the market we made a little over \$900,000. So instead of sending the percentages to the chapters and departments and the headquarters, made a little deal where they took \$360,000 less and we put that towards the loan. Then we had a balance of approximately 120,000, started making payments on that for the first seven months. Payments were not made for the next two years, year-and-a-half. last year --We paid -- we paid all of ours. MR. ADKINS: Do what?

MR. WALLOT:

MR. ADKINS: Paid all of ours, sir.

MR. WALLOT: That's correct. They weren't paid, in the last year 36,000 was applied towards a So then we got it down to approximately \$86,000. At that moment, our cut for the year that we sent to chapters and departments was 157,000.

That was 40 percent because the convention voted on that, it would be 60 percent to national, 40 percent to chapters and departments. Talked to the finance officer, he said, okay, let's send out the chapters and departments rebate and we can let the money sit in the investment because headquarters didn't need it at that time.

Sometime later, I got a call from Ernie and, okay send the money over. And at that time, instead of getting 60 percent, they got the normal 40 percent of what the first check was for, so therefore, there was a difference of \$78,000 that national should have received. So now, the Finance Committee, after explaining this, and we have some money left over then, if we put -- apply that \$78,000 towards the loan, we're going to end up owing somewhere -- I've got a conflict of interest here -- not a conflict of interest, but the difference in my numbers of three or \$4,000, that could have been the interest that was figured on the first seven payments or the last.

And as Will Rogers said, as we explained in the Finance Committee, if you remember, Will Rogers he said, "I'm more concerned about the return of my money, than the rate of interest on my money." So

1	if we take the interest off the loan, the only loan
2	balance is going to be somewhere between two and
3	\$5,000. This year, if we hold that back out of the
4	general funds portion, the loan is paid for and not
5	brought up again at any of these conventions.

So instead of us getting the -- all of that money, it wasn't a deal that was voted on by the Supreme Body and the NSC -- the NEC, that we would take our portion and repay 360,000 back into the -- to pay the loan. So that money has been put back in there. And then for my year as national commander of the 480,000, it was almost paid back.

MR. WETZEL: Okay.

MR. RIVERA: So it was a -- it wasn't a dope deal. It was voted on, and it was all -- and there is minutes of all of it at the convention.

This year we 22 actually probably would have made more but with the 23 Google Ads, we actually accumulated \$5,000 to help 24 pay for increases within our space for our Google 25 support system that we have for the drive, and I



think within the organization.

Miscellaneous grants, zero. Other revenues for the art store, which I believe was what they give the percentage, they gave us, correct? Okay. So 1,500. Okay. Building lease increased this year so for this year, we'll -- there will be a 34,608, and that's for Building C. The MOPH fund, we have 2,500. Membership dues, we're estimated 60,000.

These next three that are highlighted yellow were all restricted accounts. The scholarships 20, the truck one is 20, the disaster relief is 3,963.

ROTC revenue is 40,000. 2025 convention and fees, we said about 130 would be 35,000 -- yeah, 35,500.

Scholarship application fee was 8,000. VAVS, which is another restricted of 5,000. And then the payment -- a total payment for this year for the Life Membership was 52,490. Total income year is at 804,512.

Moving on to the program disaster relief. We have 5,000. Legislative advocacy will be another 5,000. Purple Heart magazine and advertising at 20. Scholarship at 20. Truck one at 20. Purple Heart Trail, we have at 1,000. Software development we have 1,500. Suicide Awareness we have 5,000. VAVS, another restricted, we have 5,000. Youth services,

5,000. And that would be the total for 875 for the year.

Regular payroll expenses, we have our two employees and tax, that come out to 82,600. We have a subcontractor that we keep on for all of our social media editing, everything that we have that goes out, advertising, have it for the year for 18,000. So it's a monthly that we have in the accounting services. So I have 10,000 just for the audit, so I have 10,000 for Ernie's year, 20,000 for James' year and 20,000 for Chris' year, another 20 for Carder's year with the Virginia taxes of a 1,000, so about 71,000 a year. Awards, for the commander's awards, we have 1,250, and the patron of the year award we have 2,000, which brings our total of 3,250.

Banks and credit card fees and service charges, we have 1,500, Flipcause is 150, international POS, which is 120, PayPal 180 and PayPal transaction fees for everything that we do when we process is 6,500. So our total will be 8,450.

Equipment expenses, we have a brand-new copier, which is a lower rate to the previous copier. It's only one and we're only paying for one and not for three so our expenses for the copier this year with

maintenance, everything is 4,832. Our postage machine, which is Pitney Bowes, we have 1,905. Copier cost per copy after a 1,000 free black and white is 120. So a total for that for the year is 6,859.

Events, so convention recording, we have set at 5,000, the printing recording for 2025, 6,000. Expense selected for the host department, 19,500. Convention, the Zoom and audiovisual 6,000. Veteran's Day Memorial wreaths is 2,500. There was an increase this year for that due to the fact that we are going to be at more spots besides the Tomb of the Unknown. We still have to make sure that we cover the Vietnam wall, and the Korean wall, and then the other ones that we'll cover for the next year, because we're actually expanding and bringing awareness about ourselves to all those other events. Business insurances, our D&O, which we have covered up until May, so we have to pay next April or --April, May. Yeah. So we pay May. It's 8,500. Hartford Insurance is 1,500. Philadelphia Insurance Company, which is our general liability is 2,600. Travelers Insurance, 3,000, and then another one for a 1,000.

Legal expense. We have our legal services for

900 and our contingency for 5,000. Office supplies, general supplies, 1,500. QuickBooks desktop, which I believe we discontinued this year, correct?

MR. RIVERA: Yes. We are.

MR. OLIVAREZ: So it's 900. Our QuickBooks online is 3,392. TrueShred is our shredder company, comes once a month, 420. And U-Line for 4,500, and that would be for the office expenses that we have. Postage, FedEx, we have 200 for the year, Pitney Bowes, 6,000, USPS 100. Shipping the national convention items for this year and next year, I do have them both at 600. Professional Services for a statutory service, we have 500, HOA for building C is 5,420, building -- or sorry, Building B. Building C is 5,464.

Repair and maintenance. We have that stuff set aside just in case REC wants to go out and break a door. Lighting, 10,000. And for our janitorial service that we have come in once a week, it was 2,988. Taxes on all of that is a 1,000. So the total for that would be -- or sorry, total for the first one is, 1,298, taxes is a 1,000.

Communication, Verizon, we actually were able to lower the amount of phones we had, so we're doing



better on Verizon and Internet phone bill. So we have 4,567. Election Buddy, we bumped it up to 300 because there is going to be an increase this year. Google Domain, what's -- is at 1,200. Our Google G Suite is 5,519. Mailgun is \$50 a year, and cost of contact will run us about 2,975. I have a budget that have been given for everybody and utilities, Building B will be 1,771. Building B takes care of themselves. Our water for Building B is a 600.

Workers' comp, we have 1,000. Grievance expenses, we have 2,000. And in -- company, we have 500 for the MOPH store inventory replenishment and the general is 500. Life membership payout for a chapter should be \$209,636.19. Membership dues, 50 percent of that funds. So as you can see -- so for '22, we had 17,500. Same thing for '20 -- well, in both quarters. That's all I have. Membership dues that we paid for this year was 30,000. And as Patriot Wallot says, we have a little bit left, and we should be cleared on our dues. So total expense for the year was 700,283.24 that come from restricted accounts. So -- I'll put that there. The total of funds remaining will be 48,963 from my restricted accounts. General operating fund, we have 244,900. Our current price balance is the same

for the escrow, we have 16,891. Same for checking. 1 2 Totals out to 307,791 for that and other restricted 3 accounts. For PayPal, we have 29,728. Membership 4 -- truck run relief, we have 23,963. And as for the 5 disaster relief scholarship, we have a total of 6 76,959. And in scholarships, we have 100 in one of 7 the accounts, and then youth programs at 130,751. That's it. And the other thing is, I would like to add, personal thing here, the ladies auxiliary did not show up this year because they got no money from the foundation. I would like to put the ladies auxiliary in there for 20 or \$30,000 and we can at least help them with a room for their thing, otherwise who does all the work at home and the

MR. OLIVAREZ: That's for the year, so --1 2 MR. SMRT: That anticipated expenses or are we 3 actually contracting that individual? 4 MR. OLIVAREZ: Contracting. 5 MR. The 21 list price was 14,000 for what we have in this room. 22 And I begged on my knees to get it down to 9,000. 23 You're going to -- the bottom next year, my guess 24 the discounts are going to be a little bit less, so 25 I would -- I would budget for 14 plus and -- and



hope for something close to -- close to that.

As far as the convention fee -- so the convention fee this year was 125,000, \$125 per Patriot. The real cost on that is about \$178, and we had to raise the money for the rest of it. So the convention fee was nowhere near what it really should have been for people to come to -- come to this.

And then you have the -- I see that the travel for reimbursement for the region commanders and such, everything has been reduced from last year, Just because I travel for business all the down. time, and I have a team that travels everything's been reduced, but travel is up about 35 percent over last year, and that's up 30 percent from the year before. So you're taking away -- it looks like you have the travel budget, everything except national commander, the senior vice, junior vice, and such. For everybody else, we're losing members daily, and if you want people to come up to D.C. for the different events, you're expanding the events of Memorial Day, Veterans Day, you know, it's still going to cost the region commanders to have people come up out of pocket, but just cut it half -- you know, their -- half their travel budgets. And, just

so you know, it's just -- and everything's going to cost much more.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Thanks. PNC Siebels?

MR. SIEBELS: PNC Siebels. Referring back to that \$18,000 contract. Since I understand this is a new contract. Could you tell us the details about that and why we need it now and didn't need it last year?

MR. OLIVAREZ: So with our social media marketing director, we've actually had an increase with people knowing about what we're doing and with the tasks that a lot of the membership have, it's easier for us to contract out to get stuff out there and they're putting stuff out daily for us. So getting out there and bringing awareness and spreading the news about the MOPH is actually helping them benefiting us. So I figured contracting someone out to help us to get out there, which is all the same as advertising and marketing, but we set, you know, a bid to pay for the new contractor. So that's actually helping us. So that's why we decided to keep somebody or try to get somebody for the year.

MR. SIEBELS: Okay. I understand. But I just don't see why we -- we've had it done before, but



now we need a contract written? I -- maybe it's just me. That's okay.

MR. OLIVAREZ: We -- we're doing far better than with having a contractor or someone doing it for us.

MR. SIEBELS: Okay.

MR. OLIVAREZ: And we also have nobody in the house that can do it for us. PNC Rivera?

MR. RIVERA: Yeah, PNC Rivera. So one of the things on this, and I know that things have been a little bit different. If you notice in the past few years, we've had to carry over what was not spent. This year, if you notice on here, it is in the general — the general fund of the money that we have. If you go down to that right there, 300-and-something-thousand dollars, I mean, I don't have it memorized because I worked on this, \$131,000 in restricted money and part of that's going to be spent.

Currently, right now, we pay -- for a new member, it's \$200 to join. \$100 goes to national for them to operate on it. It was about, I think it was like \$30,000. The other \$100 goes into the life investment account. And then when the life investment account money is invested, 60 percent of



that goes back to national and 40 percent of that 1 2 goes through the departments and the chapters. And now we're looking up there and there's about 3 4 \$400,000 in a general account. So that money -- the 5 life membership money is money that we all paid 6 into, right? That money's supposed to be in there 7 for us to get a rebate. So the bylaws prohibit us 8 from changing the 60/40 split. We cannot do it 9 according to the bylaws. So I'm going to make a 10 motion that national pays the departments and the 11 chapters a second life member rebate this current 12 year out of those funds. 13 MS. KELLER: Jo Keller, department commander of California. Second. 14 15 MR. OLIVAREZ: Any discussion? No? All in 16 favor. 17 ALL: Aye. 18 MR. OLIVAREZ: All in favor? 19 ALL: Aye. 20 MR. I'm still wondering how the \$5,000 was 19 used last year since I was not allowed to see any of 20 the money, and the money, again, is -- I heard that 21 it was -- part of it was used to perform another 22 activity that wasn't suicide awareness, and I was 23 So I want to know if the program chairs 24 should be aware of what is used in their budget when

their budget is not used because money is taken out

of this account for something else, so when I request the money to be used for merchandise, for training, anything else, it's not available to me. I just want to know what happened.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Okay. What do you have to say?

MR. WERTHEIM: Yeah, Craig Wertheim on the

finance committee, and for the different committees

that -- so -- we -- I looked at the budgets from

those committees, and I don't believe I saw a budget

from the suicide awareness committee at all this

year. So I don't -- I think that's one of the

reasons why no money was dispersed to them.

MS. KELLER: Sir, there was \$5,000 in the budget plus \$600 that was there from a donation that I wasn't able to use as well.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Commander Ferguson?

MR. FERGUSON: National Commander Ferguson.

First thing is -- is that -- from the floor. Thank

you. I knew -- I knew I had to come down here for

something. All right. First thing is, I've never

seen the budget from the National Suicide Awareness

director. If there was one, it was supposed to go

to either the junior vice or senior vice. I've been

on top of this when that was here to get a budget -
that was here. The money is there. It was always

willing to spend. She was never, ever denied any of the budget that was on there. It was never spent. Two e-mails, when I go back and look at this on 10 July, there was one sent to the senior vice, but he said he had no attachments of an invoice. Finally, when one came to him was on 28th July, two days before we closed the budget, and it was for an invoice of items to come to the convention. We're closing out the year. And in June on the 30th, two days, we get almost a \$5,000 bill for paraphernalia for the convention.

Before I made a decision, I confirmed that with not only the junior vice and senior vice and the national finance officer and the national adjutant and the deputy asking, is this something that we need to do? They all explained to me, stating that this would be something to do if this was presented earlier to us. Being at the end of the year, it was hard to close. We are passionate to move with the Suicide Awareness Program, but we did not get any of the information. So it was not denied, that was the decision of what had happened. Thank you.

MS. KELLER: Jo Keller. There was several conversations to begin with the last election and everything was, yeah, yeah, we have the support,

this is the money and the budge, and I've been discussing it. Yes, the e-mails came out late because we had been discussing it on the phone. talked about it. Yes, you can get paid for materials, the merchandise, whatever. Nothing ever happened. I'm always saying, oh, this can't be done, or this is here, or this is there. So yeah, I did finally put it in writing late because nobody was answering. But I had had conversations regarding the money, regardless, I just want to make sure the next person that takes this over knows how to access it and can access it, which is the \$5,000 plus the \$600. I don't know how you would intend to bring back the money that was used for something else rather than suicide, to put that back in the budget. So where does that money go?

MR. WALLOT: It goes to the general fund.

MS. KELLER: Because I believe once it's put in for suicide awareness, that's what it should be used for, and if not, then the chair should be aware of where that money is going to go if it is needed somewhere else.

MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. So if you're -- if you're referring to the \$2,200 that was sponsored to the suicide awareness program for a patriot that is

going to have a table on -- and at the ESPN National Olympic Trials, that is a full suicide awareness program that we're doing. So there was 2,200. So the reason that was approved is because there had not been a budget, and during the year we were looking at different line items.

I'm the finance officer. I don't approve anything. We go by based on the budget. national commander is the only person that can approve the spending, the national adjutant writes the warrant. The national commander approves the spending. When we were going through all the line items, this individual had reached out and said that he had gotten into triathlon as an alternate therapy for his own personal suicide stuff. So he was telling the story. He won in the State of Florida, the triathlon, and he made it to the Olympic trials and to the nationals in New Jersey in September, so he said we can do this as a suicide awareness. so whoever next year is going to be able to go and attend, and he's going to have our logo in the front and back of the uniform. So it's going to be a major suicide awareness for our organization and the program. So that was what \$2,200 was spent on.

MR. WETZEL: Yes, this is Raymond Wetzel, senior vice, California. The problem that I have is, like anybody else, is that the -- you say that I say -- the order has had problems with non-transparency for years. The problem I have is, is that any one of us that has a business that is in charge of money, regardless of what the situation has been, would have been, or will be, is that the fact that you're going to take the money and sponsor something for a program, you always let the chairperson know. Period. You don't just go ahead and take it upon yourself because you're the finance officer or you're the -- you're whatever, and you do it and not tell anybody.

The bottom line is, is that the chairperson that's running that program should be aware of it.

Bottom line. And I don't care what program it is, whether it be suicide awareness, a JROTC program, whatever. But whenever -- if something is borrowed from and taken from an account, the chairperson in charge needs to know about it, and should be being CCed on it, whatever, and made known about it.

That's the bottom line. That's my point, that the body should know that.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Will you guys grant PNC Rivera a



chance to speak for a second time? 1 2 ALL: Yes. 3 MR. OLIVAREZ: All in favor? 4 ALL: Aye. 5 MR. OLIVAREZ: All opposed? Go ahead. 6 MR. RIVERA: Okay. This is a different hat. 7 National finance officer, it is a separate thing. 8 So the national finance officer, like I said, I did 9 not approve this. That's not my job. When the line 10 item is there, regardless of what the program is, a 11 warrant is written, and a bill is presented by the 12 national adjutant. And there was two times 23 this year, we voted on a new budget because I said 24 you don't have the money to do that. Well, we're

This will save us some time tomorrow when we come back through here to get the budget finally approved that's on here.

Now you've got an idea of what we're looking at, you can go back and put questions that's on that, gets in front of Finance Committee, Finance Committee knows the things on it. That's it. That could happen. If not, you could -- like Dennis said that it was going to take 30 days. There's not anything being hidden, secrets that's here. He's actually working in with the finance officer, trying to get things under. He's asked me questions of what we spent on budgets, and how things are going

to work. But he put some time in, to try to figure out some of the budget that's here to get things done. And that's what he's trying to show you. Here's what I've done and looked into. Always, we're going to have questions about this, and you're not — it is the spirit of the debate. I think this is great that you asked the questions because at least you're concerned about it, and we can figure things out.

Well, obviously we had a miscommunications with the suicide awareness director because we didn't understand where our budget comes in. That's one of the things I did talk about each program. It's not just that area. We also have the park trails. We also have scholarship. What are we going to do there? So we put money in there, so that money needs to turn around and have somebody who's in charge of that chair give us the budget and how it's going to be spent. So X amount of dollars. Let's throw — so we put \$5,000 in for suicide awareness.

Let's make this real quick. So one of the things is, we can't have trainers, but maybe we have counselors. Or we have somebody a point of contact in each one of the departments, or maybe it is in the region area. So say that takes, you know, \$500.

So now we know we can only train ten people. So that's kind of one of the things we look at. Are we going to use part of that for travel? That's where that budgets need to be brought down. It's not up here, it's the national. It should be presented to the national commander. So then, that way, we can understand it. So that's our biggest point where we're looking at. It's not just one person. It takes a team. Once this is done, then it goes into the finance committee and we can break it down, and then I can understand and ask the questions. Pending any questions on the -- what has been done with the budget, anybody else have any questions on it?

Take silence as golden. So we're moving forward. We need to get a couple more things done. Real quick, all the reports, such as for the committees has been in the delegates. So if anybody has any questions about the -- any reports in the delegate book, such as -- we're looking in here for -- such as the adjutant, Americanism, you know, chaplain had his letters, that's in there. So everybody has everything in the delegate book, so that will save us some time. If you guys read that and have any other questions, let us know. All of our chapters have participated in the JROTC program this year, so they've been giving out their JROTC awards. North Carolina, they host their Purple Heart dinners. And then this past year, they did the POW/MIA dinner. We will be having our



Purple Heart dinners in North Carolina again in August. So the national staff coming in, if any of them want to attend the Purple Heart dinners in North Carolina, please let us know, and we'll get you a ticket and reservation at the hotel for those dinners.

The other states, the other departments, South

The other states, the other departments, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, have been participating in the Memorial Day ceremonies and Veterans parades. Georgia has been one of the busiest departments we've had. They've been doing a lot of Purple Heart entities, so most of their cities are becoming Purple Heart entities along with some universities in Georgia as well. And that's all that I had.

MR. MCINTOSH: Anything from a previous year dies when our convention starts. You cannot go through bylaws from a previous year and say that it was created. So I mean, right now, any of them — any of them that you brought over are going to be in violation of the bylaws, if you go ahead and approve them.

I was on the Bylaws Committee up until the time I

questioning your integrity. Don't -- please do not -- do not think of it that way. Many of us have had many years of experience on this committee. have found from time to time, in the best -- even when we think everything is the way it's supposed to be, there -- exceptions happen that are unintentional. Like several years ago, the Bylaws Committee worked long and hard all year long, but because of a thing that the adjutant did, the bylaws were not submitted to the -- to the NEC in a timely manner, and all that work was thrown out the -- by the convention because the rules were not followed. Well, it had nothing to do with the Bylaws Committee. It actually was an administrative error of the adjutant at that time, which was not Chuck, by the way.

So we're not -- we're not meaning to question the integrity. We've all been where you're sitting, pretty much, many of us for many years. But we want to make sure that the bylaws are followed by not only the Bylaws Committee, but the convention, et cetera, et cetera. So yeah, it -- it's -- the best bylaw -- the best bylaws that we can make will be because of some very robust discussion of people with differing opinions. And ultimately, that gets

Whatever didn't get passed when that gavel stop -- goes down and the new commander takes over, it has to be done next year. I don't know if that process was followed here. I have no idea. But I think that is the substance of the question, who submitted it, and when they

submitted it, I think everyone shares. 1 2 MR. WERTHEIM: So these were all submitted in September. They were reviewed. 3 So --4 MR. FRANKLIN: Name? 5 MR. WERTHEIM: Craiq Wertheim, Department of 6 They were all -- they were all submitted 7 in September, reviewed, debated, voted on, approval, 8 six yea, zero nay. SMRT: As a point of, you know, just historical reference, for the longest time, the order attempted to keep a one person, one small group at bay, where bylaws -- not resolutions, but bylaws amendment, and that's something that could be discussed at a later time, how the conflict of calling a amendment is being called a resolution, and how there are two separate versions of that in the bylaws themselves, makes that confusing, we tried to make sure that it had the work laid up from the lowest level. There were many years where commanders, by virtue of having unique control of other individuals, submitted things, but didn't have the stamp of a department. So it wasn't really organic. It was selectively moved. And that's why we're concerned about a single individual pushing something in. Yes, the committee finally reviews it after some consideration, some legal opinion, or review. Obviously, the JAG is not a member of the committee.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Right.

MR. SMRT: And then you have to move forward.

And you ratified that what you're seeing, and

So if there's a ruling that you're going to go, I don't know what you want to do, or you just want to move forward, the only question I have now is, will we, as Kentucky, be able to defend our bylaw resolution here at this committee before we defend it on the floor? Because your motion was to just accept everything, leave, you know, or close the meeting and -- and --

MR. OLIVAREZ: Worry about --

MR. SMRT: Got it. If I may point a personal privilege, just promise I'll release the mic for a while. Every one of these summaries for the original packet that was sent out was listed, you know, as the 2024 dash whatever number given to it, and just a generic summary of what was contained in that as a short crib note or reading CliffsNotes before you started digging in. With the exception, notable, and personally frustrating, 2024-14 was written up in its summary with an editorial opinion. We in previous years have asked that no one render

"an opinion," you render, as a committee, either your approval or disapproval to forward, but you don't disparage the nature of what the amendment is in your summary. And that is a little frustrating, that it's sort of like adding a little cheating at the end when it says, "If approved, this will hamper and restrict the Bylaws Committee from carrying out its diligent duties and responsibilities as currently defined in the bylaws." I'm not sure who wrote that statement, but that is already indicating an opinion and a direction of the committee instead of just presenting exactly what we have asked the committee to review as the resolution that came from the Department of Kentucky. Comment, sirs and lady? MR. GRAY: Keith Gray, Bylaws Committee,

MR. GRAY: Keith Gray, Bylaws Committee, 1 2 Department of Arizona. Everyone will be reviewed 3 individually at the committee moving forward. 4 back to the other four, they were submitted prior to 5 the national adjuvant being appointed. My first 6 notes that I have on them would be the meeting on 7 October 3rd. So that means they were submitted the 8 month prior, to get that under the water. As far as the last half, remind me again? 9 10 MR. TAYLOR: Who wrote the opinion? 11 MR. GRAY: Oh. 12 MR. TAYLOR: Who wrote the opinion? 13 MR. SMRT: The editorial opinion rather than a 14 generic summary, so as not to prejudice --15 MR. OLIVAREZ: Robert Olivarez, chair. 16 would've come from the national judge advocate. 17 MR. SMRT: Again, sir, he's not a member of the 18 committee. This was reviewed even in past years 19 that the national judge advocate has no voice in 20 your committee, other than to render opinions and 21 assistance to you. And if he wrote this, he doesn't 22 have authorization to do that. It -- it's merely, 23 supposedly, supposed to be a quick summary, not a, 24 oh, hey, if you do this, you're going to suck. 25 MR. GRAY: So we need to make the correction on

the record when we go to the body to disregard that 1 2 statement. MR. SMRT: Well --3 MR. ADKINS: That's a little hard to do. 4 5 MR. SMRT: Thank you. The shot is already out. 6 Hopefully, it just grazes our ear. 7 MR. ADKINS: Patriot Adkins, national adjutant. 8 Last year, we had these same members complain that 9 the judge advocate did provide a review. Regardless 10 of how it was written, what I asked for is we set 11 the judge advocate's review aside and discuss the 12 merits of them without them. And that's what we 13 did. Does it make it hard to pull back? I agree. Yeah, it does. It's out there. You may be a department commander, but 25 you're a bylaws committee.



MR. REED: Right. 1 2 MR. MIDDLETON: State your name, sir? I'm 3 sorry. You weren't in the microphone. 4 MR. FERGUSON: Oh, I'm sorry. 5 MR. ADKINS: This is Chuck Adkins, national 6 adjutant. Anytime you hear that somebody speaks and 7 does not state their name, poke the guy next to you, 8 and he will, you know, have them stated. Don't 9 enjoy the poking there. 10 MR. MCINTOSH: McIntosh. Here's another 11 microphone for you. 12 MR. SMRT: Thank you. 13 MR. WETZEL: I got --14 MR. OLIVAREZ: Go ahead. MR. All we had was the resolutions that were presented to us to vote upon, and -- or to correct, or to whatever we did with them at that point in time. So just, you know, all the bylaws were voted upon on its own merit.

MR. OLIVAREZ: Patriot Smrt.

MR. SMRT: I must -- I'm back at the microphone. Smrt, Department of Kentucky, as well as delegate from the chapter. Frustrating and gives one pause. Once again, I point out, adjutant has no other responsibility, other than to render opinion and assistance to the committee -- or excuse me, judge advocate, and does not have any place to be the author of the things. I have multiple years of past experience on the Bylaws Committee. It was our

duty, not only to review and -- and work with, if people submitted in time, to help them get it correctly for the process, otherwise we had to accept and vote only on what was submitted from the department. But once we assembled our packet, then we as a committee had to put together the summary. We didn't job it out to anybody else.

Now, that may have been unique to, you know, us who had been on previous committees. And I just want to forward out, that is equally disturbing that this was farmed out, again, to the judge advocate and then just cut and paste because it's your document. And if you gave someone else the responsibility for your document, shame on you, guys.

MR. ADKINS: Chuck Adkins, national adjutant. I can remember during the years 2016 and 2017, where the -- where the judge advocate was live on the bylaws meeting and was able to give real-time opinions on resolution amendments that were going to be considered as resolutions. Thank you.

MR. ABBEY: To point privilege, Ed Abbey, parliamentarian pro term, freshly confirmed. A motion was made to adjourn, seconded. It cannot be withdrawn. It has to be voted up or down per

That opinion should've happened in committee, been discussed in committee, and -- and accepted or denied, whatever. So I would suggest that it -- as you move forward, that you no longer do that synopsis thing. Just give us the resolutions, you know, one through whatever, and when we -- when you -- you'll vote on them; you'll bring them to the floor, and hopefully, we'll have robust discussion about each and every one or if you do your job well or whatever it is and it's an obvious thing, there won't be a robust discussion. It will simply pass. But we don't need this additional, you know, anecdotal whatever it is, this is my opinion. Whatever it is it is this particular case, I have to admit, and I don't know how I'm going to vote on that, but it is very prejudicial,
