Let us look forward to it 6 together. Let us pray. Dear Heavenly Father, thank 7 you for awakening us this morning in our right mind, 8 giving us our health and strength. Let us be 9 positive about today and look forward to what you 10 have and our intentions to do. We thank you, and we 11 believe and trust you. In thy name, we pray. 12 AUDIENCE: Amen. 13 MR. FERGUSON: All right. Everybody have a 14 seat. Everybody had a good meal and good sleep last 15 night? 16 AUDIENCE: 17 MR. FERGUSON: Well, everybody's talking. 18 Everything good. So right now, we have an 19 announcement from the department commander of 20 Arizona. Please. 21 MR. GRAY: Keith Gray, department commander, 22 We are going to withdraw our resolution so 23 we can get today's proceedings on and move along 24 faster.



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MR. FERGUSON: Everybody understand that?

AUDIENCE: --

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: All right. So next, one of the things I want to talk about real quick, you -- we got behind. We're probably about four and a half to five hours behind, but I'm trying to get it -- make it up real quick. We have a lot of things we were going to do Tuesday afternoon. So one of the things I want to talk about, and then I'll bring the individual up here -- trying to look to see where he is at. Oh, there he is. Okay. He moved on. of the things I want to talk about -- this was brought up to me when I went to this Third Department Convention. And this person has done a lot of stuff before with a well-known company. one of the things he's passion -- I felt his I felt his virtue that was on this. passion. And his reference, how do we publicized and put the Military Order of the Purple Heart out?

One of the things about it is, we see commercials for BMW, DND, American Legion, right? Wounded Warrior. You see all those things on there. Why do we not have a commercial for us? The Military Order of the Purple Heart, it's the metal we all know that has so much meaning to it. One of



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the things that was right in front of me, these people are making millions of dollars off of their advertisement. We put that mail up there. Why can't that -- we not be one of the richest VSOs, besides being one of the poorest. The key thing is, how do we get this out? Having the team, telling our story, where we've been, where we've been at.

We got to move ourselves together as -- on this.

Can't just be one person and beating drums that's here. It's got to be all of us collectively as a team.

We want to help out our programs, our families, everybody that turns around and is willing to give us a hand. I don't think I've ever heard anybody say no when I'm asking for some help for the Military Order of the Purple Heart. They want to turn around — they may not be able to do a lot, but some of them didn't even know who we are. I'll be honest, I never do this — I — after I got injured, it was probably six or eight years before I even knew anything about the Military Order of the Purple Heart. That doesn't need to happen. We need to let them know who we are. So one of the things is, as we were saying, this — making this commercial. This person has a great idea of moving and putting



this out. And I'd like for you all to take a couple of moments and listen to him.

So Harold, would you please come up to the microphone? You just come up to this one and address the audience. This is Harold Molbert. He's a department adjutant of Louisiana.

MR. MOLBERT: Can I turn my --

MR. FERGUSON: Sure. Turn around and face the audience.

MR. MOLBERT: I had a real good job before I joined the Army, but I got tired of it because I didn't do much. I was the only Maytag repairman. worked for the Maytag company. Some of the top-known commercial characters on TV, number one is Santa Claus, Ronald McDonald, and then in the top five, old, lonely Maytag. We have that same commercial, even though it got bought out by Whirlpool about 20 years ago. They still use that same commercial year after year. And people recognized the product as being reliable.

Wounded Warrior Project raised almost \$288 million last year, most of which from their television ad campaign. Tunnels to Towels, they started after 9-11. They asked for \$11 a month. Wounded Warrior Project asked for \$19 a month. Why



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can't we ask for 10, or maybe more? What would it cost for one commercial during prime time during the week? Prime time is defined as about 1600 to one --2100 and over the air -- 30 second commercial with ABC, NBC, or CBS is about \$364,000. But think about the reach. What if we started off with a 30 second campaign and we use you guys and you tell -- you start off with the commercial by saying, the purpose of this commercial is to educate all Americans on what the Purple Heart is, means, and the sacrifice we've given to our country. Wounded Warrior Project is very successful. But you can be a member of Wounded Warrior Project even if you weren't wounded.

We need seed money. How would -- National doesn't have the money to start the commercial program, so what if we use some of you guys to go on TV, Fox and Friends, maybe their CBS morning news shows, and talk about it and tell America the commercial is coming. And in the meantime, they could put up the QRC code. And the announcer, or yourself, could point to it and say, you can donate now, and also put the website that they could donate to. Once the commercials are in place, we need to have an inbound calling center. And that -- we don't have to buy a calling center. We don't have

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to hire. All of that can be contracted out based on call volume, inbound. If it is slower than what we thought, we hired 30 intake callers -- phone people, we can cut back. More -- more phone calls, we can adjust. I haven't talked to too many people that said it wouldn't work. Do you guys think it would work?

AUDIENCE: No. --

MR. MOLBERT: Somebody said no. Why? Yes, sir.

MR. HANSON: Because we don't have the money.

Because how do I get on TV. Because Wounded Warrior has this project on a long time ago and collected all that money. I have several items.

MR. MOLBERT: I think America still has deep pockets. I understand that Wounded Warrior Project started their advertising campaign and asking for so much money a month, and a whole lot of other non-profits adopted the same idea. Not a 100 percent that it would work. But to get onto those TV shows — who — Joey that's on Fox and Friends, he lost both of his legs. He was a EOD tech. We can talk to him. Morgan Freeman is a former Marine, and he's from Mississippi. We can talk to people. We can talk to their public affairs people and ask them if

we can be invited onto these shows. 1 2 MR. WALLOT: We can't get 100 percent 3 participation from the members here to send into our 4 Legacy fund. I mean, it starts at home. 5 can't get it going here, how do we expect the rest 6 of the nation to help us out? 7 MR. RANDOLPH: They started that by asking for 8 17.82 a months. 9 MR. MOLBERT: \$17.82 on what? A national 10 commercial campaign? 11 MR. RANDOLPH: No. When we tried to do it 12 internally here --13 MR. FERGUSON: Guys, if you -- if you're going 14 to come talk with us, it -- comes to the microphone. 15 I'm sorry. So that way we get it in the minutes. 16 MR. RANDOLPH: The foundation tried this, by 17 the way. 18 MR. MOLBERT: We won't know unless we try. 19 MR. RANDOLPH: Not our foundation, The Purple 20 Heart Foundation --21 MR. MOLBERT: Right 22 MR. RANDOLPH: -- went on Fox and Friends --23 MR. MOLBERT: I don't want to be the turd in 24 the punch bowl here, but the -- the foundation --25 Purple Heart Foundation went on Fox on Friend -- Fox



and Friends on August the 7th, Purple Heart Day. Jim Blaylock and, I think, a double amputee, and some others. Anyway. And they -- and they got great publicity. They tried the same thing. They had a -- they set up a call center in -- in Virginia. I believe they had a hundred workstations in that call center. They did cold calling for whatever. And let -- you all know how greatly successful the foundation has been. I mean, they're not getting crap. So you know, it takes money to make money. I agree. And we've heard all this, we need to get this celebrity and such, but we've --I'm just telling you, we've been unsuccessful at this point. And the response of our membership to our simple, little 17.82 a month Legacy campaign was pathetic. I think we raised 500 bucks or something like that.

MR. RIVERA: PNC Rivera. So the Legacy program that we currently have right now has built up through the years that it was started. It actually brought in \$17,000 last year. So that Legacy program, we have people that you can go onto our website, and you can sign up, and it's 19.95 a month or any amount you want. So we thought that that program was -- okay. Nobody's doing it. But I can



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tell you that it's actually building up. 1 So you 2 start with -- you know, \$17,000 a year is pretty 3 decent. My recommendation would be to take that and 4 advance that program out. 5 One of the things we have to remember is we 6 have to be very careful because we are not 7 authorized to utilize the word mark Purple Heart without permission of the foundation. So that's a 8 9 caveat to all this. You know, these are great 10 programs, but if we don't get permission from the 11 foundation to utilize the word mark Purple Heart, I 12 guarantee you that if we did a program like that, 13 they would hit a lawsuit on us immediately. MR. RANDOLPH: We're allowed to use the 14 15 Military Order of the Purple Heart --16 MS. BROWN-GREENE: Who just said that? 17 MR. RANDOLPH: Not Purple Heart. 18 MR. FERGUSON: We're not allowed to use the 19 words Purple Heart without their permission, for 20 fundraising, anyway. 21 MS. BROWN-GREENE: Okay. Hold on. Hold on for 22 a second. 23 MR. CANNON: Identify yourselves at the 24 microphones. 25 MS. BROWN-GREENE: Hold on. Hold on a second.



If you comment, please state your name because this is going in the minutes. So she does not have to try to figure out who you are, please state your name before you make the comment.

MR. FERGUSON: Department commander from Texas.

MR. MATTHEW: Good? All right. Michael Matthew Department of Texas commander. So I'll just say and speak on my behalf, but you also have another department commander who can verify everything I say. I'm a national campaign team member for the Wounded Warrior Project. commercials that you guys see for the Wounded Warrior Project, if you look, I was a little skinnier and had less hair back then, but I've been in about three of the commercial, okay? And so, one of the things that Wounded Warrior Project has allowed me to do as a national campaign team member is anytime I speak, I'm allowed to say that I'm a part of the Military Order of the Purple Heart. Now, I know we probably don't get any money from that, but it does at least show that there is an organization out there. And I'm in a lot of commercials, and I travel all over the country and speak. And anytime I get up, one of the first things I say is that I'm a member of the Military



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Order of the Purple Heart.

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So this can definitely work. I will tell you that when the Wounded Warrior Project first started doing these commercials about ten years ago, they did not think that it was going to work. the Hallmark Channel. I would get calls and texts from my aunts and uncles saying that they saw me while watching Texas Ranger or something like that. But it works. All we have to do is just do the work and continue to do it. Don't -- don't stop. gets going, it's going to be a little rough, but I promise you it will work to help us get our name out there. It will work to help us raise funds. Because there are a lot of people that when you say that you are a Purple Heart recipient, they gladly The State of Texas, my guys can tell want to give. you, we have people that will come up to us and I'm doing an event for Purple Heart support us. Day. The entire event is paid for and sponsored. don't have to pull out a single penny from the department to put this event on because it's all paid for and sponsored simply by saying, we're Purple Heart recipients and we want to do something for a Purple Heart recipient.

So I would strongly suggest that we look a



little further into this. And if you don't want to spend the money, there's always things like YouTube and Facebook that you can do for absolutely free. A 15-second clip on YouTube is absolutely free and you can receive streams of income from it every time someone clicks on that. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, Department Commander.

Department of Pennsylvania?

MR. SEGWAN: Shawn Segwan, Department of I think at this point, everybody Pennsylvania. knows I've worked for the Wounded Warrior Project. I've been working for them for seven years. been a Purple Heart member and recipient for a heck of a lot longer than that. Well, I agree. Getting our name out there is a big one. We need to be working on some of the smaller stuff, too. brought it up there on the finance committee. Like, I get a commercial. Commercial might be a great one. I actually greatly agree with that in there because my son and daughter have no idea what a television cable channel is. They stream everything. instead of going for a commercial, paid advertising that might be 300,000, we're probably getting more bang for our buck doing something like getting one of those pop-up ads playing during YouTube videos.



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Because those aggravate the living crap out of my children. And I know you guys have no idea what it's like. But that's there.

One of the things I brought up in the finance meeting that I would highly recommend is there's a lot of free options that we are not doing as an organization that would make a lot of sense. first one is public service announcements. all across the frigging nation. If we have a preset of public service announcements that are free, local chapters can send those to those local radio stations. And now we are being broadcast across the nation for free. Mind you, they'll fit it into the spots where they do it. But every radio station has a mouth that they're going to want to do that counts to them as giving -- that counts to them as the tax write off and all that fun stuff. So having those PSAs going across the nation, at least audio, reminds people that the Military Order of the Purple Heart exists.

The other thing I would highly recommend, and I'm going to throw him under the bus because he's going to be a bigger expert than me, but the gentleman that was just talking. We have Purple Heart recipients all across the nation. I go to



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conferences all the time. And I never see one of us as one of the guest speakers. When you go up -- get up there in front of a guest speaker, that's not me asking for a donation. That's not me, you know, doing that side of the house. When they're having a conference about the effects of mental health on veterans, this is the crew that knows. This is the crew that lived through it. This is the crew that lived through it for decades after combat. These are the ones that we need to be talking about, like how did you make it through?

So you should be up on that panel talking about it. Oh, by the way, they're going to put your name on the marquee. Oh, by the way, Military Order of the Purple Heart's going to be in the brochure. Oh, by the way, we're going to have somebody in the audience that's going like, hey, can you tell me a little bit more? That might be a new young member or that might be a donor that's like, hey, we — that — you guys are really doing that? So the audio aspect of sharing our stories is where it is. I agree with the TV commercial. It is not a bad idea. But sharing our stories is the key one. I'm about to be cut off, and I love you guys.

MR. FERGUSON: I think you -- you're the junior



vice of Florida, am I correct?

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MR. BARNES: Yes, sir. Louis Barnes, I'm senior vice --

MR. FERGUSON: --

MR. BARNES: -- and I want to reiterate a lot of what he just said works, and we appreciate the honorary work this week. We had Channel 6, I went We did an interview down there, had them come down. in the truck and everything, and they put the Nashville and the local names on it. And I saw the money come in already. They had an interview with the Nashville and the -- and the Florida State commanders, and it went well. They even said they would do anything for us. All we got to do is ask. I'm not afraid to go in. I thought people ought to go to get that -- go and ask. That -- they can only say no. But if we do this, it's going to be spread. That little bit now already helps this convention. So thank you.

We -- I'm not afraid. I ask -- tell people it's coming. It -- you'll be surprised what you get. I've worked on programs right now. Some of the people that donate, I say, "Happy new year." They say, "What do you want for?" They don't even take my name. So I'm for it, we can do it. I'll do



anything planned. I know some other people here in Florida, they want to help. See if they can set it up. They didn't know half the stuff that we did or has happened to us. Let's educate them. That's all.

MR. FERGUSON: Okay. Thank you. So Terry, after you I'll let Harold in a matter of time. And then I'll make a couple comments and we'll move on.

MR. T. ANDERSON: Terry Anderson --

MR. FERGUSON: And we got one on the line too, sorry.

MR. T. ANDERSON: -- Region 2 commander. I've been pushing this for quite some time. When I started my business, I had no money. I went after every freebie that I could get. And over 40 years I started in -- and I was doing TV commercials. Info commercials, the little, small spots can be used. But what we have to change in this order is this negative attitude. We tried this before. It didn't work. Well, maybe we didn't do it the right way. Maybe we were looking at it the wrong way. A new fresh idea. I think we need to be receptive -- receptive to making an effort.

The way we're going right now, my brothers and sisters, we're going to die. We're on a death



trope. We're going down because we aren't ready to fight. A lot of us are old. We're tired. I'm tired. We have to start relying on the young guys. They're the guys we got to put up front and push them like hell and encourage them. And I think that we can do this because, listen, every one of us had a can-do attitude. We've fought back from being beat up, shot, blown up, whatever you want to do. We've all come back from it. We're survivors. So let's start acting like survivors. Let's do something about it. What do we got to lose? If we don't do something, we're dead. If we try something and we still don't make it, we're still dead, but at least we tried. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Online.

MR. GIBSON: Okay. This is Alan Gibson, vice commander. I agree with all this. We need to change our mindset. If we want to move forward, that's where we need to start. I understand that the Military Order of the Purple Heart Foundation is doing some stuff. Guess what? They're not a recognized thing. I'll tell you the -- we've been doing a lot of -- we need to make sure people know who we are. And that is the issue. I agree with some of the -- my constituents today, that we need

to start looking outside box. Here's what I mean by that. We need to start doing things that start moving us forward. I know we have some forums, I know we have a lot of meetings, but guess what? We need to get the Military Order of the Purple Heart a recognized name out there. Every place I go -- Purple Heart, what's -- oh, I know that. I got a copy -- we got a copy here. We try to get it out here in Georgia and some other places, but we need to hit the people where they are. And that is what other people say, social media, social intelligence.

I know the man that started the Wounded Warrior Program. I remember that as well. Guess what? It's all about marketing. We need to get in with the foundation, do whatever we need to do to use our name, because guess what? We have Purple Heart wounds as well. It's just not the foundation of the name, but so are we. So we need to move forward because if we don't, we going to die on the board. We can move forward. We got the younger brothers right now. And as the gentleman said before, they're going to be our future. And we got to set them up for success.

There are a lot of things that we going to do that done with this country. You know, every time a



-- somebody said that you need to speak at -- that's the only way we get the name out there. When we sit -- don't sit by and wait for somebody to come to you and say, "Oh, you're a purple heart winner," we're not going to get there. We got to get out there and get our name out there. And I did and you basically you got to make a purpose. You got to have to drive. You got to have an influence. You got to motivation to make sure they know who you are and what you doing. And this is something I think we can fix, but we got to get going. We got to get some pedals moving. And the only way to get the pedals moving is by other people moving forward. We got to start on the committee and see what's the best idea, and we have some to get started with some ideas to do that. But we got to move forward. Got to over out here.

MR. FERGUSON: I'm asking, Commander, can we move forward with this? Sounds like it's in the order. That -- that's what I'm trying to get this morning. So thank you. I'll let Harold finish up, and then I'll give the last point, and then we'll move on.

MR. MOLBERT: Harold Molbert, department adjutant of Louisiana. Thank you for the feedback



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and the concern. I understand. You also talked about lack of participation in joining. Corey (phonetic) gave us a sad statistic. He said there's about, correct me If I'm wrong, about 250,000 living Purple Heart recipients in our country, and only about 50,000 of them -- 50,000 of them are in the lifetime membership program. We can -- we need to reach those guys. And I've heard several people say over the course of the week they never heard about the Military Organization of the Purple Heart.

I also communicated with outgoing CEO of
Wounded Warrior Project, Lieutenant General
Linnington, and explained what we want to do, and
told them I didn't speak on behalf of the MOPH, but
my ideas and how we didn't want to compete with
Wounded Warrior Project. And once I explained it to
him, he believes that it can fit, and it can work.
So I asked him if I could talk to the person that's
in charge of his direct marketing, John Hamre, H-AM-R-E. He called me the next day. And he's willing
to help me, help us with this program. And they
even give grants. What if we applied for a grant to
at least start the commercials? I'm on a lot of
pain meds. I've had 15 surgeries. I've had four
back surgeries. And I'm willing to work the first

year whatever it takes, no charge. I'm on Social Security disability.

I have a best friend, a master sergeant I served with in combat that lives three miles from the national headquarters. And I used to work with the Pentagon, so I go up to DC four or five times a year. I just got back two weeks ago. So I'm willing to go up to National and do whatever it takes, meet with the people. I travel. I won't -- I won't ask for gas money. I won't -- I can do this out of my own pocket. I don't need to ask the order for any funds. I'm a retired lieutenant colonel. Uncle Sam took pretty good care of me.

What else? So the commercial wouldn't be just about begging. Like other people said it would be a way to educate Americans on our sacrifice. We truly are unique, more unique than any other organization. And Wounded Warrior Project is just so well known. And I -- I think we can try. If it fails, it fails. But we won't bankrupt National. We'll figure something out. We'll figure out how to get the money. I appreciate everyone's concern and support because if we move forward with this, I can't do it by myself. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank -- thank you, Patriot

MR. FERGUSON: It is always great to recognize people that do good work for us. It is a small token of our appreciation, so I really appreciate everything that they have done, so -- but they said, did I add that long line, it all adds up? I figured it was pretty good.

All right. A couple of things I need to bring up. We talked about some things, and these are programs I need to see how the body feels about this. One is ROTC. We've talked about this for quite a while, and really quick, we want to make it even easier to get your ROTC youth leadership awards.

What we talked about is actually putting this certificate online. You, as a chapter or compartment officer, can log in under the forms and get that certificate off. All you would have to do is put the cadet's name in there and it's ready to print. That way you don't have to worry about it being shipped from headquarters, anything on it; all we would do is ship the medals to you.

Trying to make it easier. One, it cuts down



from the \$20, what you have is on there. The only cost you would have is printing it. And then we're looking at the average of a price of \$8 for the award, that would include shipping. But if you order, like, 20 or 30, then we will turn around and that would all be great, but you would have to contact headquarters, they can figure out what the rate is, and then obviously it would be a little cheaper. So I don't know if anybody is interested in that or not, I'm bringing that up in front of the body. So if there's a motion on that -- I got a clap. Go ahead. Go ahead, Craig. I got a clap, I'm doing good.

MR. WERTHEIM: Craig Wertheim, Department of Florida. Do I need to make a motion or --

MR. FERGUSON: Make a motion if you would -- if you'd like that, yes.

MR. WERTHEIM: Can I make a comment before I -or I make a motion? Okay. He's gone. I make a
motion that we accept -- accept this with the
ability to print the certificates embossed, though.

MR. FERGUSON: The embossing, that's going to be a little different that's on that, because I don't know what each chapter or each department.

Right now as the bulk of -- of the embossing, how we



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have to order, that is in ten to 20,000s, that's on 1 2 So in other words, we have some certificates 3 and things left, we do give out a lot of awards and 4 things that's on that. But here's the thing about 5 it, I don't know of a chapter that can do that. 6 What we're looking is using the color MOPH logo on 7 the top where the embossing is. Okay? 8 MR. WERTHEIM: I'll retract that, then I make a 9 motion to not accept this. 10 MR. FERGUSON: Okay. So we got a motion. Do 11 we get a second? Do we --12 MR. WALLOT: I'll second that. Dennis 13 Wallot. 14 MR. FERGUSON: We got a second. Discussion? 15 MR. WERTHEIM: Craig Wertheim, Department of 16 Florida. I think handing out an award, that chances 17 are that -- well, not chance are. That they 18 individual -- they take very -- they take pride in 19 getting that award with the medal and then that 20 certificate will probably be a -- a keepsake long 21 after they lose that award. 22 It means something and handing them a piece of 23 paper versus a piece of parchment with an embossed 24 raised seal means much more than us printing out a



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certificate. And the ability to print those

certificates in mass, it's going to detract from the award. So I feel that if we can't go the full a 100 percent, then we shouldn't be doing it this way.

That's just my opinion, so --

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you.

MR. KING: Department of Virginia, Ben King,
Department Commander of Virginia. I do not like
this idea. The embossing on the paper is important
and I think that needs to be sustained.

MR. RODGER: Phillip Rodger, Chapter 707 Palm
Beach County. The last three years, I've obtained
and delivered probably 20, 21, 22 certificates
through the seven counties that we work in. I would
have delivered more, but I just got busy driving
back and forth in the state.

They don't come with a name in it, so I figured out how to get it lined up. Now they don't come with a year on -- the year of our work, so I got to figure out how to get the text in there. I'm not a printer, so that makes it difficult, but -- and I do print -- when I have to print a certificate out, I do print it on a embossed paper.

But I, you know, get the whole thing, it's a fold over thing to keep it nice when they move on to something else. And like Patriot Wertheim said,



they'll lose the ribbon, but they won't lose the certificate, it will be in their bookcase somewhere. And when they start realizing they need to document their successes in the world of military and through JROTC and ROTC, the certificate is a much better thing to give them.

MR. FERGUSON: No problem. Thank you.

MR. RODGER: Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, Patriot. Yes.Charles Anderson, 326?

MR. C. ANDERSON: 326. I'm the coordinator of ROTC program in California. We issue more than 300 certificates and medals each year to California high schools and universities. A lot of those recipients send us thank-yous for whatever reason, because they are the ones who did the work to earn that. But the point is not one has said, damn, that was a fantastic, embossed certificate.

The important thing to the cadets are the ribbons because they wear that every day. Even the medal takes a back seat to the ribbon because the ribbon is on your uniform and visible every day. Students in high school go up to them and say, what did you get this ribbon -- hat is this ribbon for? what does it mean?



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So to turn this option down, simply because you can't have an embossed certificate, in my opinion, and I do tend give an opinion of this because we are going to do it the way we do it in California anyway. But the thing is, we just want you to know, hey, we appreciate that offer, and the only question I have is, if they go online, are they going to be signed by the commander or do we get to do that on the -- on the department notice?

MR. FERGUSON: So the answer to your question, they are already pre-signed and all you have to do is put the cadet's name in, everything would be correct. So we'll give you what -- all you have to do is add in the cadet's name.

MR. C. ANDERSON: All right. Thank you, sir.

MR. FERGUSON: Yes, sir. We got a question online from PNC Garcia? I can't hear it, is there volume?

MR. LEIGHTON: This is Larry Leighton. I was just wondering if we've done any analysis of possibly providing buying the certificates — embossed certificates at bulk at National and then distributing those to the chapters instead of using their own paper?

MR. FERGUSON: So long story short, what he's



asking real quick. Yes. We do buy -- already buy in bulk, that's where we got it down to the price.

Each certificate, I'll just spit this out, costs us almost around \$4 a certificate to get. That's buying at ten to 20,000 certificates at the time that's here. We have an arrangement with the group, so they will only send us what we need per for the years. So that's one of the things we have.

The next we are forgetting is that now we've got the folder, which is over \$5. So on that folder, that was there 4.0 something that was on here, and then you actually got the medal itself. Tying the box and everything up, total cost up to \$20, around about \$17.83. But guess what? We didn't count about the packing that goes in there, the time for the employee that goes in there. So we're really not making any money off the ROTC Program, it breaks even on a single quarter. The only way we've ever saved anything was when we did it mass. PNC Garcia?

MR. GARCIA: Commander, thank you. Yes, sir. I'm against this and the reason being, during the convention, there was a comment made that some of the chapters were presenting coins over the medal, and doing this, it is actually the same as giving



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out a coin. Reason being, we have to go buy hard stock paper, some of these chapters will probably not do that and just go take a Xerox piece of paper and give it to the -- to the cadets.

Now, another thing you spoke about, folders. We don't need a folder, the folder goes in the trash, so all we really need is a certificate and the medal. Another thing Patriot Leighton asked about what the cost would be for the embossed things? You spoke about \$17 a medal and that you really don't make any money. But how is that possible if one chapter, which is mine, we ordered X amount of medals, we paid \$500 for the -- for the medals, it was sent in bulk. It was \$5 shipping per medal, \$150 per medal -- well, a \$100 for the medal that -for extra in that -- in that thing, because it's \$15 for the medals shipping, basically. So how is that there's no money made? I mean, you're shipping in bulk, so it doesn't cost a \$100 to send out 20, 25 medals.

MR. FERGUSON: PNC Garcia, if you heard what I said earlier, the only way that the headquarters has made money is by the bulk.

MR. GARCIA: Correct. So --

MR. FERGUSON: Yeah. That's what I'm trying to



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say. So in other words, we kind of offset some of the things there. This is just an idea, we don't have to do this. Everybody has been complaining because the reason why we're having to pay \$20 for an award -- I've heard this for the last two years that's on this. So we're trying to look at a way that we can help out with the chapters and the departments.

Now, each one of the chapters and the departments are stating that, why do we have to pay it? We never asked a chapter or department to pay for it. We've only asked that the ROTC unit contacts the chapter or the department to give the awards.

There are so many of -- that they just ship to the school and there's no presenters there, so that's why we want to at least have a chapter member or a department member to be there to present the awards. That's the main thing, that's all that is.

MR. GARCIA: Thank you, Commander.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you PNC Garcia. Yes, sir?

MR. SHELTON: Commander Steven Shelton,

Department of Kentucky. So not only am I Department

Commander of the State of Kentucky, I am a -
actually also a JROTC instructor. One thing that I

have noticed in getting these medals and presenting



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them. So yeah. The folder is absolutely beautiful. It's a waste of money. The certificate itself is a great certificate, however, and I know we left the last two digits off the date, so you have to put a date in it, and I also realize this is a national program.

So my suggestion is we have to fill the cadet's name in, delegate signature authority so the presenter can sign it because the presenter is probably the guy in the picture with the cadet, and they will remember that much more than somebody they've never seen.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Patriot Smrt?

MR. SMRT: Smrt, Kentucky, reinforcing my

department commander, we've been petitioning this

for a long time. There was a decision event -
evidently to make it instead of junior and senior,

just ROTC, we appreciate that was a change. But

I'll reinforce, no one cares. We may, but no one

cares that this year's national commander's name and

signature is on it. And I'd like to reinforce, and

offer as the opportunity, to delegate that signature

authority down there. If we're filling out the

paperwork, we'll fill in the signature block and get

a good day done. Thank you, sir.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Major Wetzel? 1 2 MR. WETZEL: Yes. Senior Vice California, 3 Raymond Wetzel, is you made a comment that you buy 4 the certificates in bulk, which is approximately \$4 5 a month. Can you pass that on down to us? Can you 6 present us the certificates and with the signatures 7 or however that you want it done and then we can 8 have it printed on the certificates? 9 At my chapter, we do 63 schools a year, which 10 includes three colleges and three young marines, we 11 pay for that, our chapter does close to \$1,600. 12 the folders, yeah, we can get folders through 13 Amazon, get purple folders, whatever it is, to put 14 the certificates in. But can you transfer the cost 15 of the \$4 for the certificates to us to where we can 16 take and have it printed out with the cadet's name 17 on it? 18 MR. FERGUSON: So let me explain first thing 19 and everybody understands, this is a national 20 program? 21 MR. WETZEL: Correct. 22 MR. FERGUSON: It's not a chapter. It's not a 23 department. 24 MR. WETZEL: Correct. 25 MR. FERGUSON: This all has to go through here.



If you look in your convention book, we have a certificate being printed out, and it is -- and I'm not going to bust this person -- group out, but they've changed and altered the certificate, and that's what we're going after. If I give you a blank certificate, how do I know that that's not getting printed for ROTC? What if a chapter or department -- and let me finish -- prints that and uses it as another award?

That's why we control this at National, and then you ask why the national commander, I'm going to answer the other one, why they have to have their signatures? It's a national program. So I don't have a problem as a commander, if that's something that the body is going to vote on, that they want to give it to the department signature on there. I think that it would be fine if it goes down to the chapter, but that's something we have to vote. But this is a national program, that's one thing we have to realize, it's not a chapter.

You can always, as we know anything in there, you have to keep the standard to the program. You can add to it, because I know there are certain chapters that turn around and give money and scholarships to the kids and also know that they

maybe give them a coin or something else. You can add to it, but you can't take away.

MR. WETZEL: And I understand that, and maybe I came across the wrong way. You -- because you said that you would put a digital form online.

MR. FERGUSON: Right. On the access.

MR. WETZEL: On the access. So what I'm saying is if you send us the certificates, you know, and we print them out, whatever that is, because we have to print out on a regular piece of paper. So why can't we have the blank certificates to print what you send us onto the embossed certificates?

MR. FERGUSON: So did you hear what I said a while ago? That's something that in other words, we send a blank certificate out, we will turn around and how do we know that you're going to print that out just for ROTC? So you had something left? Oh, we didn't get an award so now we're going to make the commander of Chapter 1234 has an award and they have that out there, and it has an embossed seal on that.

So there's no standardization. If this is what we're going to keep for our program, just as we know in the military, we keep uniformed about everything. So if we're going to change this uniformity, it has



got to be voted on as the masses that you're -MR. WETZEL: Right.

MR. FERGUSON: -- so again, you know, that's why I'm trying -- all this is, is just a presentation or a proposal. It doesn't mean that this has got to be accepted. Everybody's -- the number one complaint, it costs. So I've found out a way to eliminate all the costs and making a suggestion that's on here.

The other part that we got, just like you said, how many people know that a school all of a sudden calls you up three days before they do that, and you don't have anything? So now, you are able to at least get the certificate and print towards them and then you can get the medal later if you don't have it. But if you order enough medals, that certificate, you're ready to go, so it's a solution for a couple of things, but go ahead.

MR. WETZEL: Okay. The only thing is that what I was going to say is, and I understand, and I would hope that with the integrity of who we are, that nobody would do that, and I know that we, as a chapter, would not do that.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. I surely appreciate it. Thank you. Next? And then the -- this will be

almost the last one because we got to continue on.

MR. SEGWAN: Got you. Shawn Segwan out of
Pennsylvania 455. I just -- the one thing that I
have that I disagree completely with, I just want to
throw it out there, is ever thinking any signature
should be on there, other than national commander.
When I retired, I didn't have some random delegate
sign my retirement paperwork, it was, you know, good
old president at the time. Right? It means
something. It shows the level of the support that
it is at national level, and that signature on it,
even if it is a pre-printed one is coming from a
national commander of a national organization.

It's also something that these kids, especially the JROTC, are putting in with their college applications. They might even scan a copy of it, depending on what they're doing; it might be a brag sheet for them. There's a whole lot of different things and having that little signature is a mark of honor, and I think it kind of takes away from the prestige of the award. And that's not saying that our chapters are any less cool, but prestige award is the national award, and I should see whoever is sitting at the top of the -- top of the panel here on top of that certificate.

So my son is in the Sea Cadets, I know it would 1 2 mean a whole hell of a lot more to him to see that 3 big seal on it than it would be to have, oh, and 4 that's my dad's signature at the bottom of the line. 5 Oh, I love you, buddy. All right. Thank you. 6 MR. FERGUSON: I got a call for a question, 7 so --8 MR. WITT: Can I speak before we call? 9 MR. FERGUSON: I got a call for the question 10 before you got up there. 11 MR. WITT: All right. Thanks. 12 MR. NEWELL: Oh, what -- which is it? I'm the 13 ROTC officer and I really would have appreciated --MR. FERGUSON: All right. 14 I will -- can we let 15 one more speak and this is it? 16 MR. NEWELL: I'm Roger Newall, I'm the ROTC 17 program coordinator for youth programs. I really 18 wish someone had spoken to me and said, hey, this is 19 what we're going to do. I will tell you quite 20 honestly, the problem that we have come up with 21 because of the certificate and this, that, and the 22 next thing, and the cost of it is because we were, 23 as a national program, unable to fund the program. 24 If we bring the program back where it's funded,

25

where all you have to do is request an award, then

everything can come out of national office like it 1 2 was, it will look proper. The only question I have is I'd like my name replaced -- to replace the 3 4 adjutant's signature, since I'm the person that's 5 running this program or theoretically, I am. 6 Other than that, I appreciate all your support, 7 but guys, we need to pull it together. This is --8 this is a national program, and we need to learn how 9 to support and make it work. Thank you. 10 MR. FERGUSON: All right. So we have a motion 11 to -- we have a motion to disapprove this first and 12 second. All in favor for disapproval? 13 AUDIENCE: Aye. 14 MR. FERGUSON: Please show your hands so I can 15 tell? MR. NEWELL: For which? 16 17 MR. FERGUSON: This is disapproval -- for 18 disapproval of doing an online certificate and 19 ordering the medals? 20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Aye for the motion to --21 MR. Fund, Inc., is a 501 (c)(3) that needs to stand up
and raise its own money and give us money. We
shouldn't be giving them money. So I make a motion
that we disapprove this.

Let 4 5 them do their job. We've elected Finance 6 Committees, whoop men, and ladies. Let them do 7 their job. 8 MR. FERGUSON: We have one online. 9 MR. LEIGHTON: I would -- I wasn't raising my 10 hand. I have nothing to say. 11 MR. FERGUSON: Okay. No more? All right. Call 12 for questions. All in favor to --13 AUDIENCE: Restate the motion. 14 MR. That's our total possible 6 -- sorry. So the grand total possible, as you can 7 see, is displayed on there is 48,344. When you 8 divide that out by 12, that is 4,029. FERGUSON: Have a second. Open for 7 discussion. 8 MR. RIVERA: Page numbers in Delegate Book. 9 MR. FERGUSON: Yeah. Definitely. PNC Rivera --10 Finance Officer Rivera. What's the cost, and has it 11 gone through the Finance Committee? Okay. 12 MR. RIVERA: It's the first that we're hearing 13 about it with a cost factor. There is a cost of it, 14 right, or is it free? 15 MR. FERGUSON: No. It's not free. 16 MR. RIVERA: Okay. So yeah. The --17 MR. LEIGHTON: That is something --18 MR. FERGUSON: Yeah. I say we table it, so --19 discussion online? Larry Leighton. 20 MR. LEIGHTON: It is not the first time we've 21 heard about it. The convention got a good look with 22 the outline. How do we -- we propose and see, is a 23 adopt and adapt recommendation, and study what the 24 cost was presented to go forward. But we at least

They took around 5,000 members to find out how many would want the Purple Heart Magazine in a hard copy edition, how many would go with the online edition. Then he came up with the factors of the numbers, if I remember right, what it was going to cost for that, if the Patriots were willing to pay, I think it was \$35 or \$30 a year, to get the hard copy additions. Am I correct? Larry Leighton?

MR. LEIGHTON: We don't know the cost. We don't know the total number of pages. We don't know how it's going to be distributed. The recommendations in the book -- let me pull up the book so I can read it to you. An implementation plan to be fixed in such a way that printing and distribution costs are not incurred prior to collecting subscription payments to cover those losses.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. We're going to do a ceremony that's here that's -- everybody have their seat. I'm sorry. We're going to do a little ceremony. Most people will recognize this from the



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military. Remember, we talked about historic history and passing things on, so I'm going to ask the two sergeant at arms to assist me. Naturally, ask you to -- if you can, kind of explain the part, what's going to go through this.

MR. ADKINS: In every military tradition in every unit, when you have a change of command, there's a ceremony where you pass the flag from the old commander to the new commander. And that is what we are going to do today.

It will be passed by National Sergeant at Arms, to provide N. Schwartz (phonetic) to the past national commander -- now past National Commander Carder Ferguson, who will then transfer it to the new national commander, Robert Olivarez, who will then in turn pass it to his sergeant at arms, Gary Witt. it's -- it is important. If anybody's ever been in

the military has, and at all the times, seen the

change of command, to me, that's our symbolism.

That is our flag. That's what we are all about.

And it's entrusted through the next national

commander, which entrusted to the sergeant at arms



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to take care of that. So I think that is awesome.

Now I want to bring it up for the good of the Order. So we're going to have Keith Gray. Keith's going to come up and bring up a program he wants to talk about.

MR. GRAY: Thank you, Past National Commander. Keith Gray, Department Commander, Arizona.

MR. ADKINS: Hey, Scott? Scott. Okay. He's working.

MR. GRAY: So this is a program. I ended up just running into a representative from the company called LegalShield. All of us need to have some legal protection. Some of you may already have this program, but in Arizona we've kind of adopted it and we are using it. And they're going to partner with us and give us a cut of the subscription to get signed up. We will have our own link. You'll get a discounted rate on top of that, and we'll go through it. Hopefully it'll pop up here in a minute. So they give the presentation way better than I will. The regional VP that we are dealing with is out of Hawaii. I have some information on him that'll pop up.

Essentially, just making sure our members are protected. You can use it for anything. As we get



older, we want to make sure our estates are in order, so planning wills. If you get a little heavy on the gut, golf carts around here in Florida that you get a speeding ticket. They'll help you with that. If you get sued, you can definitely reach on to have a lawyer on-call 24/7. You can purchase extra stuff on top of the base plans, like gun owner plans. If you own guns, it's similar to the USCCA protection that's out there, but it's the leading one in the country. It's one of the biggest legal protections that we have.

There we go. Okay. There we go. This is our regional, Ben Hellinger (phonetic). He's the regional vice president that is leading the way in helping us and wants to make sure that all patriots are protected, and he -- as a veteran himself.

This is their regional headquarters and some of their partners that they partner with out of Ada,

Oklahoma. So you might know where that is.

Here's a list of some things that they help you with it, and it works out. I actually have an appointment scheduled when I get back for an issue I was dealing with. Myself and past National Commander Ferguson signed up with them and already put into use.

Again, this is some other things that they help you with that just helps you to be legally protected, which is something I feel is big, making sure you're always protected. You just want to protect the assets that you have. And this is an additional protection for yourself to make sure -- you know, identity theft. It kind of watches all that, and that's part of the package that we're signing up with. I've already got this done.

These are the current group rates. These are not our discounted rates. I was told that it's in the neighborhood of \$5 off for the single and \$7 off for the family. They're still waiting to get us our numbers. They kind of want to see how many of us are going to sign up for it, and then as we pay monthly, we can set up to get a little rebate. That's also going to be a conversation to have with the national leadership to find out how we want to receive that rebate from the company. The other option we can do is we can also sell this program and get a larger rebate. So that's another conversation we'll have and keep you guys informed and get your input on that before making decisions.

Again, malicious. Some of the LegalShield,

IDShield that you can get protection and additional



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coverages. But you also get perks for being a member. So all of these companies you get discounts at just by being a member of LegalShield. I can try to answer any questions you have, but it's really just kind of scratching the surface with this and more will come to follow. MR. WALLOT: But the Order is going to get a

cut of it?

MR. GRAY: Correct. The Order or the fund, however it's the most beneficial to set it up, whether it's a small monthly estimated payment, or what -- we're going to fish out those details in the coming days. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you, Department Commander Keith Gray. And I will tell you one of the reasons why I signed up for it, I didn't know how this convention was going to go, so I wanted to make sure I had some coverage. So all right.

MR. GRAY: You need to talk to a licensed health agent.

MR. FERGUSON: I did. Yeah. I need to do that, too. I am correct on that one. So I know we have one more speaker, but I see two at the microphones. So Pennsylvania?

MR. SEGWAN: Hi. Mine's a little -- real easy.



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It's a good -- honestly, it's a good news story, but it shows why it's so important for us to have a seat at the table when we're going to different committees and meetings, and conferences all across the nation.

Because of the good work of that man in the corner, Phil, and many like him in Pennsylvania, we recently got one of our state benefits actually not going out to the veterans again.

To give you the short version of it, what it is is in Pennsylvania, they say that veterans get 100 percent of their property tax. You don't have to pay, right? 100 percent. You don't have to worry about it. What it isn't is -- well, now, is they put a monetary amount that you cannot make below a certain point. Okay, somewhat fair. They count our disability against us and our military benefits against us, and that puts it above absolutely anyone that has maybe a job or their wife has a job, or spouse.

So because of the great efforts of that man right there and others like him going to all these meetings and pushing it it got back to where that now has been redacted and it's just 100 percent for those who are involved. So he, and people like him,



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and all of you who work on the state levels with 1 2 your state heads, and things on those lines, he just 3 helped thousands of veterans across the state of 4 Pennsylvania. So I just wanted to give him a round 5 of applause. 6 MR. FERGUSON: That's awesome. 7 MR. ARNOLD: Great to be here. 8 THE REPORTER: What was your name, sir? 9 MR. You get a chance to fly and use a shuttle bus taxi, Uber, learn how to do the escalators, elevators, and we were able to experience and do things that I couldn't do when I was 2 years old. Tango is 2, by the way.

Tango is actually a future alpha dog in training. And you probably noticed yesterday, he got a consult by Brody, who -- who is actually his great- grandfather and -- so he just wanted to make sure you knew that you have to -- he wanted to thank all of you for your tolerance, patience, and understanding, and then tell you that any barking is just some doggy stuff. Some -- you might see a pecking order stuff. So Ernie, thanks a lot for all you do for the veterans with a service dog. I think it's a fantastic program. Thank you.

MR. FERGUSON: Thank you. Are you good from there, Ben? Are you good from there, or do you want to go up?

This program is set up to if you buy the program, it will cover your house with all of your needs from dishwashers to refrigerators, to anything in your house. You will get an extreme discount instead of just going to Lowe's and Home Depot.

For this weekend only -- when I say this weekend only, because my mind is in the weekend.

Until Thursday afternoon at 5:00 p.m., we are doing a deal. That means if you buy into this program, which is only \$100. \$50 will go back to your chapter. She is waiving her \$25 fee right now. WALLOT: So this investment policy, the 13 only thing, if we -- right now, it's all managed. 14 80 percent of it -- of our stuff now, when we take 15 the money out, we reposition a portfolio, so it goes 16 back to an 80/20 to start the year off with, and 17 that is after the funds are withdrawn for the double 18 dip for the chapters and departments, and the 60 19 percent for national, right? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Uh-huh. 20 21 MR. WALLOT: Okay. Everybody knows about the 22 money. Now we got 524. Out of that, we've still 23 got the loan that's going to be paid off. 24 going to come out of the share for the National



Organization.

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MR. PICKART: Amount? 1 2 MR. WALLOT: \$4,115.60. Pay out to? 3 MR. PICKART: 4 MR. WALLOT: The general fund. 5 MR. PICKART: Thank you, sir. 6 MR. WALLOT: Okay. That's coming off of their 7 portion of 60 percent. Then the loan will be taken 8 care of. We won't talk about that anymore. 9 Okay. The only other thing we have, the reason 10 you gave me your name and address, the banker's 11 going to be calling you as well as the -- we've got 12 three accounts at Chase. One equity, one fixed, and 13 one ETF portfolio, exchange-traded funds. That is 14 in -- that is in healthcare, energy, financial, and 15 Those are the four big ones that usually 16 pay, okay, the highest rate of return compared to 17 utilities and other things like that. So we're 18 going to keep those four. 19 And the other thing we have is TVA bonds. We've 20 got about \$200,000 in TVA bonds. Those pay -- and 21 they're going to go probably lower because the 22 interest rate now. It's 100 percent that the fed 23 now -- the percentage rate gets. It's 100 percent 24 that the Fed's going to lower in September.

25

MR. PICKART:

What's the lifetime of those

bonds? They're traded any way we want to? 1 2 MR. WALLOT: They vary. 3 MR. PICKART: Okay. But --4 MR. WALLOT: Three years to 30. 5 MR. PICKART: Just what -- thank you. 6 MR. WALLOT: Okay? So when we bought them 25 7 years ago, and they renew, some of them, could have 8 been five-year bonds then that renewed last time 9 around at 2 percent year-and-a-half ago. So if we 10 sold \$1,000 bond today -- you were going to buy a 11 bond for \$1,000. You can buy a bond that pays 6 12 percent interest for \$1,000, or you can buy my bond 13 that I want to sell you that only pays 2 percent, 14 but you're only going to give me \$850 for it because 15 of the difference in the interest rate, okay? 16 you're going to discount the bond because of the 17 interest rate that it's paying. All of our bonds 18 are paying less than three. 19 MR. PICKART: Wow. 20 MR. WALLOT: So we want to move a lot of that 21 stuff -- or at least the older ones. The older ones 22 are paying less than it. So we want to discount 23 those and get rid of some of those. 24 MR. PICKART: Who's our vendor? 25 MR. WALLOT: That is also through Chase.



MR. RIVERA: Chase. 1 2 MR. WALLOT: That's the broker. Of those 3 bonds, I'd like to cash in the smaller ones from the 4 TVA account and balance out the portfolio a little 5 bit. Right now are cost in the four ETFs are about 6 \$30,000 a piece, and the bonds are, like, 125. 7 MR. PICKART: TVA, you charge that as utility, 8 commodity? Tennessee Valley Authority, yeah. 9 MR. WALLOT: Tennessee Valley Authority, that's all utilities. 10 11 MR. PICKART: Okay. 12 MR. WALLOT: Okay? That's when they built the 13 water, built the dam, all that stuff. 14 MR. PICKART: And our -- and our previous --15 MR. WALLOT: So we want to get out of that now, 16 and I think we should go into either utilities with 17 it -- that's kind of our safety net. That's our 20 18 percent that's the -- on the fixed side. We're 19 going to get a guaranteed rate of return when we use 20 that portion, okay? 21 So I'd like to move some of that, at least --22 and rebalance that portfolio out. Right now our 23 equity portfolio and the bond portfolio are 24 basically balanced. No more than 3 percent of the 25 whole fund, the 2.5 million, basically -- 3 percent
